National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan), is a national-level apex body under the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan) (DEPwD), Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India. The institute focuses on quality services for the life cycle needs of persons with multiple disabilities, conducting research, developing human resources in the field of multiple disabilities through long-term, short-term, skill development, employment, assistance, and livelihood support programmes.

NIEPMD develops transdisciplinary multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary models of services to provide quality care and services through a professional approach in the areas of Prevention, Early Detection, Early Intervention, Inclusive Education, Skill Training and various rehabilitation services for Persons with Multiple Disabilities.

SERVICES

The team of professionals comprising from departments such as Early intervention, Medical Intervention, Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy, Prosthetics & Orthotics, Special Education, Clinical Psychology, Speech, Hearing & Communication, Audiology, Vocational Training, Guidance & Counselling, Community Based Rehabilitation and Special Clinics (Psychiatric, Neurology & Ophthalmology) provide services to meet the needs of individuals with Multiple Disabilities.



Department/ Unit wise Activities

1. Services and Programmes

The services include registration, detailed analysis, referral, psycho-education, the orientation of schemes, programme, benefits, respite care and training programmes. The department functions as the facilitating unit between the different departments.

A total number of 16,667 new cases and 1,63,937 follow-ups, beneficiaries were registered in the service unit during the reporting period.

2. Medical Science

Promotion of comprehensive medical management - including assessment and diagnosis, treatment of health conditions, prevention of disabilities, and treatment of complications, is the main focus of the department. During the year 2021-22, 2000 new cases & 3682 follow-up cases were rendered services from the Medical Science. This department provides specialty clinics and services to meet the health care for the stakeholders. During the year 2021-22, 3,222 New Cases & 5,077 follow-up cases were rendered services from specialty clinics.

3. Prosthetics and Orthotics

The prosthetics and Orthotics unit is catering to the needs of the person with neuro-musculoskeletal dysfunction resulting in impaired mobility, coordination, and optimal functional outcomes that restrict their functional capabilities and full participation. This unit assists them to achieve maximum functional capacity and enhance fruitful participation. This unit registered 348 New Cases & 1,489 Follow-up cases during this year.

4. Physiotherapy

Physiotherapy provides services for persons with movement difficulties to develop maintain and restore maximum movement and functional ability throughout the lifespan and is also concerned with physical, psychological, emotional, and social well-being thereby improving the quality of life of people with disabilities. This includes providing services through habilitation and rehabilitation for movement and functions threatened by aging, injury, pain, diseases, disorders, conditions leading to impairment, and disability. During the year 2021-22, physiotherapy unit rendered services to 865 new cases & 8,426 follow-up cases.

5. Occupational Therapy

The occupational therapy unit enhances the quality of life, participatory level, protecting rights of individuals through creating a barrier-free environment, and through rehabilitation services and also provides effective and efficient occupational therapy services to the beneficiaries. During the year 2021-22, 661 new cases & 9,791 follow-up cases were benefited from services.



6. Clinical Psychology

The Department of Clinical Psychology is actively working towards mental health concerns and the rehabilitation of persons with multiple disabilities. It caters its services through various psychological assessments, interventions, and psychosocial rehabilitation. The department had registered 1,181, new cases & 6,908 follow-up cases in 2021-22.

7. Speech, Hearing and Communication

The Department of Speech, Hearing and Communication is committed to providing clinical services to individuals with communication disorders and addressed the needs of persons with hearing $\mathcal E$ balance disorders. Apart from comprehensive assessments of speech, language, hearing, swallowing disorders, issue of hearing aids, the department provides intensive speech, language, feeding therapy to clients. The Audiology lab built-in universal design, equipped with state of art instruments for detecting and diagnosing hearing loss became functional this year. The department had registered, 823 new cases $\mathcal E$ 14,432 follow-up cases during 2021-22

8. Early Intervention

The Early Intervention provides services in early detection, identification, and intervention for children in the age range of 0-6 years. It also empowers parents and family members in the care and management of children with disabilities. During this year early intervention rendered services to 1,816 new cases and 24,740 follow-up cases.

9. Special Education

The Department of Special Education, National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities established in 2005 focuses on Special Education clinical services, training HRD's through various courses from diploma level to masters level and to contribute to the holistic development of Persons with Multiple Disabilities. It follows the guidelines of various educational facilities for persons with disabilities and tries to develop the service delivery models from exclusion to inclusion, to promote community participation of persons with multiple disabilities. During this year 343 New cases & 10371 Followup cases availed services from the above department.

Special Education unit of Model School is designed for children with Cerebral Palsy, Autism Spectrum Disorder , Deafbliness and severe to profound disbilities. The school provides an mental age appropriate individualised curriculum to facilitate educational empowerment of children with multiple disabilities. During this year 155 children with disabilities were enrolled and 24,768 sessions were attended.

10. Adult Independent Living

The Department of Adult Independent Living functions to provide adequate support for adults with multiple disabilities to lead independent lives. The service includes assessment, vocational guidance, skill training, and vocational training programs for adults with multiple disabilities. During the year 223 new cases and 3,686 follow-up clients were trained.



11. Social Work

The Social Work Unit emphasises the innovation, meaningful participation and promoting an inclusive society by empowering the individuals, families and community to utilize the resources and to facilitate changes aimed to empower the persons with disabilities by using various Social work methodologies: Casework, Group work, Community Organisation, Development, Advocacy and Research. Social work also involves delivering appropriate services by networking with DPOs, NGOs, Universities, Colleges, Schools and other government bodies. During the year 2578 new cases and 18740 follow-up clients were benefited.

12. Library and Information Centre

Library and Information center plays an important role in furthering the academic & research mission of NIEPMD and facilitating the creation and dissemination of knowledge. It has an excellent print collection of more than 5,328 volumes of books, journals, theses, reports, standards, and pamphlets. It also provides access to more than 1,563 electronic books and journals in the field of rehabilitation. It also has a printing and photocopying service to the library clientele as per library rules. During the year, 10,308 visitors availed the facilities of the library and 2,644 books have been circulated to the users. The students can access more than 48,984,683 books are available in this portal. The institute received 82 RTI applications during the year 2021-22 and replied to all the queries within the stipulated time.

13. HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

a. Long Term Training Programmes

NIEPMD is a national resource centre with one of the main objectives to promote the development of human resources in the field of multiple disabilities. The details of the students enrolled in different courses run for the academic year 2021-22 are given below:-

14. KIRAN – Mental Health Helpline

The Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment has launched a 24/7 toll-free helpline 'Kiran'. 18005990019 in 13 regional languages with 660 professionals across India on September 72, 020, to provide support to people facing anxiety, stress, depression, suicidal thoughts, and other mental health concerns. Kiran-MHRH was launched in 7th September, 2020. The total number of calls received toll-free till March 2022 is 2,256, The number of follow-up calls received is 1,437.

15. Flagship Programme

The institute has specialized services, programs & facilities for the SC/ST categories and populations residing in the North-Eastern states of India. About 123 & 107 programs were organized and 8112 & 7432 persons were benefited respectively.

16. National Board of Examination in Rehabilitation

In addition to conducting the training programs across the nation, the institute also conducts examinations for the various levels of programs at a national level through the National Board of Examination in Rehabilitation (NBER), a statutory body under the Rehabilitation Council of India. In the reporting year NIEPMD-NBER conducted 2 examinations for 09 courses in 360 (Three hundred and sixty) institutes all over India. A total number of 6,951 students enrolled during the year 2021-22.



17. Schemes

The Institute implements various schemes of the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment (Govt. of India). For instance, under the Assistance to Disabled Persons for Purchase and Fittings of Aids and Appliances (ADIP) scheme, the institute organizes identification, assessment, and distribution camps to provide aids and appliances to persons with disabilities. A total of 1,720 persons with disabilities were provided with 2042 aids and appliances in the year 2021 -22

18. Corporate Social Responsibility

NIEPMD is promoting effective measures on rehabilitation services to safeguard the rights of disabled persons and to stimulate their inner potentials through CSR activities. The flagship project of CSR initiative is distribution of digital device to facilitates E-learning, MSIED kit, N95 Mask & Sanitizers, Financial support to the differently-abled students and aluminize of NIEPMD, Free health check-up and diagnostic test for housekeeping staff and achieving the skill India mission. A total of Rs. 3,32,83000 was mobilised as CSR during the reporting year.




Fig3: Signing of MOU through virtual mode with SRM Institute of Science and Technology




Fig: 5 Inauguration of Crystal Jubilee Celebration through virtual mode








2. International Day Of Yoga:




Fig: 19 Glimpses of World Audiologist Day

No stone is left within our capacity unturned to ensure that the best opportunities and services are made available to persons with disabilities \mathcal{E} their families to help them attain their maximal potential.

The rehabilitation professionals at NIEPMD work towards a holistic & life cycle approach for persons with disabilities and attempt to practice it. NIEPMD provides a wide array of support and assistance to persons with disabilities and their families, and also help the PwD's to assimilate knowledge towards empowerment.

NIEPMD is located in a very accessible environment with the East Coast Road on its west. NIEPMD has been nationally awarded for having accessible infrasturcture and another national award for having accessible website. A client coming to NIEPMD is welcomed followed by detailled case history / client situation analysis. The client is reffered to the needed department where, individualised assessment and Therapeutics / education intervention is provided to the beneficiries. 


Fig: 42 Academic Council Meeting in virtual mode






Fig: 43 Webinar on Sensitization Program



CHAPTER - 3

DEPARTMENT OF MEDICAL SCIENCE

INTRODUCTION:

The Department of Medical Science endeavours to fulfil the commitment of providing accessible, affordable and accountable quality health services for Persons with Disabilities. The prime focus of the Department is to provide comprehensive medical management rendered by means of assessment, diagnosis, treatment of minor health conditions, prevention of further complications due to disabilities and appropriate referrals. The Medical Science department plays a crucial role in the early detection and intervention of various associated health conditions among persons with disabilities. Services offered via speciality clinics addresses and takes care of the associated conditions. Distribution of anti-psychotic & antiepileptic drugs at low cost supports the clients to continue their chronic medical management. Besides, the Department takes care of the First aid and Emergency health care needs of Persons with Disabilities, HRD students and staff of NIEPMD. Medicine, Nursing and Pharmacy units function under this Department. The Department co-ordinate and conduct Certificate Course in Care Giving to train and develop caregivers for persons with various disabilities.

OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To provide comprehensive medical rehabilitation programs to the life cycle health care of persons with multiple disabilities.
- 2. To diagnose the conditions causing multiple disabilities and plan medical interventions.
- To conduct speciality clinics Psychiatry, Neurology, ENT and Dental to meet the diversifying health care needs and manage the associated conditions of persons with Multiple Disabilities.
- 4. To promote continuity of chronic care management through regular follow-up services.
- 5. To support care continuation through distributing antipsychotics & antiepileptic drugs at a subsidised cost.
- 6. To organize and conduct telemedicine services for follow- up \mathcal{E} chronic care management for clients from remote and distant places.
- 7. Refer the clients to the higher centres for accessible and affordable medical interventions.
- 8. To meet the first aid \mathcal{E} emergency medical needs of clients, staff and students.
- 9. To conduct and coordinate HRD programs.
- 10. To conduct and enhance the academic and research activities of the institute.
- 11. To conduct awareness and orientation programs and short-term training programs.
- 12. To participate in the outreach programs and camps.



- 13. To promote CSR programs pertaining to the health \mathcal{E} welfare of persons with multiple disabilities and families.
- 14. To collaborate with NGOs, State government and other medical colleges for treatment, academic and research purposes.




Fig: 56 Beneficiaries details for the last three years

Specialty Clinics



Some health conditions associated with disability result in poor physical and mental health and require extensive health care need. To improve access to health services, the Department organizes and regularly conducts Psychiatry, Nutrition and Dental Clinics.

Telemedicine Services

As an optimal solution to provide timely and faster access to health care, the department had conducted Video Consultations for clients.






These services were great help for Persons with Multiple Disabilities from Chennai and its outskirts, rural areas of Tamil Nadu, other states and abroad. Telemedicine services had helped many beneficiaries to access Medical and Psychiatry consultation and treatment and to save cost and effort during the pandemic lockdown.

Distribution of Antipsychotics and Anticonvulsants

Antipsychotic and Antiepileptic drugs are being distributed at subsidy rate to the clients after follow – up. This had lessened the financial burden of many families and supported to continue the long term care. Medicines were posted through India Post at Kovalam to the beneficiaries during the pandemic lock down.



Identification of Rare cases and Referral services

Clients those who were in need of specialized care and support were identified and referred for secondary medical management. Good networking with State Government Hospitals and other Specialty Hospitals had given hand to manage these difficult situations. Clients presented with rare cases like Congenital Varicella, Mucopolysaccharidosis, Jouberts Syndrome, Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis, Marcus Gun Syndrome, Weaver Syndrome, KlippelFeil Syndrome, Friederichs Ataxia Alternative Hemiplegia had referred to higher centers for further management. Appropriate and timely referrals had brought out good clinical outcomes in medical and psychiatric emergencies.

COVID -19 Activities:

Department had taken initiatives to promote various COVID care services during the second pandemic outbreak. Vaccination for the staffs and students had arranged with Kelambakkam PHC to contain the spread of the pandemic. Treatment and isolation rooms were identified and kept ready to meet the emergency situations. Medical evaluation and follow –up of HRD trainees and staffs who were under home quarantine had performed by the department. Preparing and submitting suggestions to upgrade COVID vaccination procedures for Persons with disabilities, coordinating and conducting COVID Screening Test for various entrance examinations at NIEPMD are other COVID related activities.

Augmenting Short-term HRD programs.

The demand for professional caregivers for Persons with Disabilities is on rise nowadays and the need to mobilize such manpower had become essential. With this aim, the Department functions in collaboration with State Government and NGOs, as a mentor to train the trainees. Action plans had outlined and shared with State Disability Commissioners' Office to augment these training programs to the other districts of Tamil Nadu.

HRD PROGRAMS

Programs Offered:

With the aim of developing professional caregivers for Persons with Disabilities, the department conducts two short-term training programs and one long term training program. Based on the guidelines of National Trust curriculum CCCG- Primary (NT-Basic-A) and CCCG – Advanced (NT Advanced – B) are offered as short-term training programs. RCI approved ten months Certificate course is also offered to train Care givers for Persons with Intellectual Disabilities, ASD, Cerebral palsy, Multiple disabilities, Locomotor disabilities and Deaf blindness. Current year six trainees are admitted to the Certificate Course in Care Giving (RCI)

The department provide faculty support to other HRD programs too. Totaly 1296 hours of theory and 980 hours of practical classes had competed during this year.




Fig: 66 Interns Posted in the Medical Science

CHAPTER - 4 DEPARTMENT OF MEDICAL SCIENCE PROSTHETICS & ORTHOTICS

INTRODUCTION:

Prosthetics & Orthotics Unit is dedicated to catering for the needs of people with neuro-musculo-skeletal dysfunction resulting in impaired mobility, coordination and optimal functional outcomes that restrict their functional capabilities and full participation. This unit by intervening with various kinds of assistive technology devices for PwDs assists them to achieve maximum functional capacity and enhances fruitful participation in day-to-day activities of life.

OBJECTIVES:

To empower the PwDs through the intervention of Assistive Technological devices aiming to regain their mobility, posture control, building confidence, maximize functional capability and full participation in the society.

SERVICES OFFERED:

A. Types of Assistive devices provided by the material development unit:

I. Postural Control device – CP Chair, Corner chair and moulded postural control seat are prescribed for children and adolescents with poor postural control and balance. These devices help in maintaining proper posture while sitting and also prevent secondary physical and physiological complications that may arise due to prolonged poor sitting posture. These devices improve physiological function as well as hand functions while performing ADL activities and academic tasks.

II. Adaptive devices – Customization and /or modification of pre-fabricated/over-the-counter devices to make them suitable for use. Examples of adaptive devices are universal cuff, adaptive writing devices, adaptive utensils etc., which are designed and developed in this unit.

III. Mobility Devices – Various kinds of mobility devices like tri-cycle, wheelchairs crutches, walkers, Rollator, and walking sticks are modified/customized to make them user-friendly.

IV. Orthotic Devices – It is a biomechanical external device applied to the affected body part. It is used for correction, support, prevention and control of a joint range of motion. Various types of the spinal, upper limb and lower limb orthotic devices are manufactured using different kinds of materials that suit the need of user's socio-economical needs.

V. Prosthetic devices - Prosthesis is a replacement for missing body part. It replicates and optimizes the lost body part and function. According to the user's age, occupation and socio-geographical condition, prosthetic devices are prescribed and fitted.

Service Delivery Protocol:

The service protocol involves registration, assessment \mathcal{E} prescription, measurement, fabrication, trial, fitment and training about the prescribed appliance followed by the follow-up and reviews schedule for optimal outcomes. As and when required the necessary repairing and replacement of appliances also are taken care of by this unit.

- 1. Registration of Needy beneficiaries for Assistive device technology
- 2. Details assessment & Prescription of different types of assistive device technology for ADLs, Mobility, Environmental Modification, Classroom seating adaptation, accessibility audits etc.
- 3. Design, development, fabrication, fitment and training of various kinds of Orthoses, Prostheses, Adaptive Devices, Mobility Devices etc.
- 4. Customization of Pre- Fabricated Assistive Device Outreach ADIP Camp across the Pan India
- 5. Repairing and Replacement of Orthotics, Prosthetics, Adaptive and Mobility Devices.
- Awareness and Orientation program to different stakeholders of society regarding the importance of assistive devices in the socioeconomic rehabilitation of persons with disabilities.

- Delivery of 3D printed Aids & Appliances.




Fig: 80 Beneficiaries details for the last three years

TRANSFORMING LIVES

In a society of greater diversity, an ever-changing environment – that's been progressing, we THE REHAB PROFESSIONALS are running faster both physically and mentally for the betterment of the PWDs. People always say that,

"ACTIONS SPEAK LOUDER THAN WORDS"

So, here's one of our actions that have begun to speak. One of our clients Ma. S. Lashwin, currently 8 years old presented to us as follows – Difficulty in standing and sitting, poor trunk balance and motor impairment both in the Upper and Lower limbs.

History stated below

Ma. Lashwin studying in a special school, MCDS - Chemmenchery comes from a lower-middleclass family whose father works as a supervisor and mother as a housewife. Her pregnancy phase was a bit stressful but the child was delivered normally with an appropriate birth cry. Also, to be undertaken that the child has been immunized as per the schedule and had achieved the developmental milestones befittingly up to 8 months.

When he was just starting to stand and walk by supporting nearby objects, he had a fever with an infection that led to his decline in achieving developmental milestones.

Examination:

Vitals were all stable. Investigation of MRI SPINE revealed that his spinal cord was demyelinated from C2 -5 and was the cause of his illness.

Diagnosis - Cervical demyelination led to Quadriparesis

QUADRIPARESIS is a condition characterized by weakness and partial loss of function in all four limbs. Just to know its symptoms that may cause spastic or flaccid muscle tones, lack of muscle control, depressed reflexes and balance problems.

Though some affected people can independently perform their ADL, many couldn't and make them physically dependent.



Treatment plan:

- Clinical psychology
- Physiotherapy
- Occupational therapy
- Prosthetic and Orthotic Services.

When he came to our O&P services, the child was initially advised for therapeutic exercises when he was 3 years. After a year of Physical examination, he had

- 1. Muscle power in the upper limb 4/5
- 2. Muscle power in lower limb 2-3/5
- 3. Hips flexed and internally rotated
- 4. Knee flexion contracture
- 5. Ankle plantar flexed
- 6. Ring sitting and inability to stand

As per observations, they were suggested with B/L Hip Knee Ankle Foot Orthosis with the spinal attachment so that it would support him to stand and generate sitting and standing balance making him physically independent.

During the fabrication, it was quite a tougher task for us to align all moulded shells so that they coincide with his anatomic structures and don't cause any undue pressure and discomfort.

The fitment period was arduous enough as he became obese due to the lack of physical activity. But nothing is impossible if we're determined for the good. Also, his mother was taught to don and doff the orthosis and the ways to maintain the orthosis for its efficient use. He has advised fortnight reduction and maximizing the duration of its usage to accomplish stability while sitting and standing.

After two months of the regular orthotic use at his school and home, Ashwin is now able to sit independently at least for 2 hours with just minimal support and stand for a longer period than during the fitment phase. We've observed some enhancement in his performance. Though it's a very minor change seen, many small drops make up an ocean.

To briefly paraphrase, it is apparent that through the consistent use of the orthosis Lashwin will inevitably squeak through the stumbling blocks of his path.











SUMMARY:

Material Development (Aids & Appliances) unit occupies a significant position in the rehabilitation process of Persons with Disabilities by providing Assistive Technology & Devices according to the impairment/disability and the person's need. They aim is to provide a solution for both gross motor activities (sitting, standing and walking, running) and fine motor activities (grasp, holding, manipulation and release of an object, etc.) in case of skeletal and neuromuscular dysfunction to make them functionally independent and achieving an optimal level of active participation in day to day life skills and activities.

The department facilitates quality education in the field of Prosthetics and Orthotics with Bachelor's in Prosthetics and Orthotics through a team of experienced faculty in the field. Methods of teaching to the students are including Classroom teaching, Clinical meetings, Clinical practical training, case orientation, etc. The students also participate in various Webinars and are encouraged to explore various academic research and project work in the field of P & O. The department also takes care of the students in the multi-aspect development through various extracurricular activities in & out campus events and competitions. Total no. of 348 new beneficiaries and 1489 follow-up beneficiaries has been served.



CHAPTER - 5

DEPARTMENT OF THERAPEUTICS - PHYSIOTHERAPY

INTRODUCTION

Physiotherapy, a part of the medical field aims to develop maintain and restore maximum movement and functional ability throughout the lifespan and is also concerned with physical, psychological, emotional and social well-being thereby improving the quality of life of people with disabilities. Physiotherapy deals with assessment, diagnosis, designing treatment protocol, treating patients with physical modalities and rehabilitation for movement and functions threatened by ageing, injury, pain, diseases, disorders, and conditions leading to impairment and disability.

UNIT OBJECTIVES

- To assess, plan and implement a physiotherapy program to improve or restore motor functions, maximize movement ability, and relieve pain syndrome, associated with injuries diseases and other impairments.
- To prepare students to perform evidence-based physiotherapy and to gain knowledge, skills and behaviours to serve the health and welfare of society.

SERVICES OFFERED BY THE UNIT

The main areas of focus in the Department of therapeutics in NIEPMD for children with multiple disabilities are Neurodevelopment Therapy (NDT), Virtual Reality-Based therapy (VRBT), Pulmonary Rehabilitation, and Electrotherapy $\mathcal E$ Gait training. Department also consists of an Electrotherapy unit which is more commonly used for pain management and muscle re-education




Fig: 84 Services Offered By the Unit



NDT is a holistic and interdisciplinary clinical practise model informed by current and evolving research that emphasizes individualized therapeutic handling based on movement analysis for habilitation and rehabilitation of individuals with neurological pathophysiology.

The aim of the treatment for children with disabilities due to brain damage is to prepare and guide them towards their greatest possible independence and to prepare them for a normal adolescence and adult life.

Gait training or **gait rehabilitation** is the act of learning/relearning how to walk, either as a child or more frequently, after sustaining an injury or disability.

Gait training helps to strengthen muscles, improves balance and posture, develops muscle memory, builds endurance, and retrains the legs for repetitive motion.

Body Weight Unweighing system is advanced training equipment, which enables early Facilitation of gait in paediatric and adult populations with multiple disabilities.

Electrotherapy are derived from the word Electro – Electric Current / Electrical Energy, Therapy – Treatment of disease, Non-surgical treatment approach. It means various forms of therapeutic applications using electrical energy as a primary source. Electrotherapy are mainly used for pain management, treatment of neuromuscular dysfunction improving range of joint mobility, tissue repair, acute and chronic oedema, peripheral blood flow, iontophoresis, urine and faecal incontinence.

LASER Therapy is an advanced electrotherapy treatment, which has a profound effect on tissue healing and acts as a powerful anti-inflammatory agent.

Virtual Reality-Based therapy (VRBT) is a new generation tool for advanced rehabilitation, which uses motion sensor (Gestures) technology to capture patient movements, which can be associated with therapeutic games as a treatment regime. VRBT incorporates therapeutic techniques such as positional stretch, tone facilitation and inhibition through games, which makes therapy sessions enjoyable, and patients was benefited through motor relearning and patterning of movement using visual cues so they will stay self-motivated and engaged throughout the rehabilitation regime.

Pulmonary Rehabilitation: Pulmonary Rehabilitation is provided for clients with respiratory problems. Breathing lab is the advanced virtual reality-based breathing technique, which improves Lung volumes, and resistance to expiration and mobilises secretion. It also provides general relaxation for anxiety patients, Reducing heart rate, slowing down breathing and suppressing fight and flight response. Advanced diagnostics equipment had been installed to access the pulmonary function (Pulmonary function test).




Fig: 90 Beneficiaries details for the last three years

BEST PRACTICES

Master Abdul Shamir, is an 8-year-old boy born with premature and low birth weight by emergency caesarean section. He was kept in NICU for 15 days child was initially diagnosed with Global Developmental Delay and later he was diagnosed with Infantile Hemiplegic Cerebral Palsy. He was referred to the physiotherapy department with complaints of being unable to sit, stand and walk.

A detailed Physiotherapy assessment revealed that the child had poor trunk control, increased muscle tone in both his lower limbs, poor balance in sitting and scissoring of legs while walking. He had achieved head control but was unable to come to sitting from the supine.

He took regular physiotherapy treatment such as facilitating Gross Motor Skills, Balance Training, Gait Training on Body Weighted Supported Treadmill training and Virtual reality Based training to improve his mobility and functional skills.

Presently, he can stand without support, walk with minimal support and climb stairs with support.

Bachelor of physiotherapy (BPT) course affiliated to The Tamil Nadu Dr. MGR Medical University had been started in this academic year 2016-17 with an annual intake of 28 students.

The primary aim is to create qualified professionals in Physiotherapy to meet the diverse needs of the country with a focus on persons with Multiple Disabilities. Students were encouraged to participate in both co-curricular and extracurricular activities in National and international conferences, Intra college activities during national days of importance such as Swatch Bharat, Vigilance awareness week, Disability day




Fig: 91 No. of Students enrolled in State and CET



Occupational Therapy (OT) is a Client-Centred health profession concerned with promoting health & well-being through occupation. The primary goal of Occupational Therapy is to enable the person to participate in the activities of everyday life, work, education, and social participation. Occupational Therapy plays a major role in enabling independence in the field of rehabilitation for Persons with Multiple Disabilities (Divyangjan).

- Provide effective and efficient occupational therapy services to the beneficiaries. It




Fig: 93 Beneficiaries details for the last three years

SUMMARY:

The Department of Clinical Psychology is actively working toward mental health concerns and the rehabilitation of persons with multiple disabilities. It caters its services through various psychological assessments, interventions and psychosocial rehabilitation. M. Phil Clinical Psychology program is being conducted in the department, that is approved by the Rehabilitation Council of India and affiliated with the Tamil Nadu Dr. M.G.R. Medical University. The faculties of the department are offering lectures, clinical supervision and guidance to fine-tune the skills of the scholars pursuing M. Phil., Clinical Psychology. The scholars are involved in academic activities like general seminars, journal clubs, case presentations, group discussions, and research projects. They were also given special training to conduct teletherapy during the pandemic period that was effectively delivered under the guidance and supervision of the faculties.



The scholars were facilitated and given opportunities to attend various webinars conducted by distinguished experts across the world. The faculties of the department were upgrading their knowledge by attending various webinars. They also disseminated their knowledge through various CRE programs and webinars to the professionals working in the field of disability rehabilitation and also to create awareness in the general public. The department was involved in the research activities of NIEPMD and published articles in national and international journals. Services were provided for about 1181 new and 6908 follow-up clients.



CHAPTER - 8 DEPARTMENT OF SPEECH, HEARING AND COMMUNICATION

INTRODUCTION

The Department of Speech, Hearing and Communication (SHC) extends its services toward fulfilling the objectives of NIEPMD. The department provides services to individuals of all age groups having issues related to Communication, Speech, Hearing, Balance, Feeding, and Literacy. The department conducts Trans-disciplinary group therapy sessions which is the first of its kind at an international level and a pioneer model for our country.

OBJECTIVES

- 1. To undertake the development of human resources for management, training, rehabilitation and education.
 - Long-term course B.ASLP (four years degree course)
 - Training for other college interns.
 - Conducting RCI CRE programs, conferences and seminars.
- 2. To promote and conduct research on multiple disabilities.
- 3. To develop a Transdisciplinary approach
- 4. To undertake service and outreach programs

ACTIVITIES

The Department of SHC has two major units which include Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology. In the Speech-language pathology unit, the clinical services delivered are assessment and management of speech and language disorders for all age groups. Speech disorders broadly include articulation disorder, fluency disorder, voice disorder, dysarthria and apraxia. Language disorder includes developmental and acquired language (aphasia) disorders. Individuals identified to have speech and language disorders are assigned for follow-up speech and language therapy services. In the Audiology unit, assessment of hearing and balance issues for clients of all the age range using state-of-the-art equipment and tests such as the Pure tone Audiometry, Immittance, Otoacoustic emissions, Brainstem Evoked Response Audiometry, and Vestibular /balance are carried out. Based on the type and the degree of hearing loss suitable management options and follow-up auditory training sessions are recommended.



SERVICES OFFERED

Major units at the department of SHC are i) Speech & Language and ii) Audiology, which offers excellent assessment and management services in the area of Speech, Hearing and Communication.




Fig: 95 Services Offered

I. Speech-Language Pathology

The speech-language pathology unit has assessment and intervention services for all speech, language, swallowing and early literacy-related problems in children and adults. In the early intervention unit speech, language and feeding assessment and intervention services are provided for children below 6 years of age. Clients with feeding difficulty especially children with cerebral palsy and autism spectrum disorders are assessed for their posture, oro motor and sensory abilities and intervened for the same. Detailed counselling is given to parents on the current status of speech and language of the client and immediate goals to be worked on in follow-up sessions and at home are discussed. Following assessment, the client is assigned to speech and language therapy sessions which happen for half an hour twice or thrice a week-based on the speech and language status of the client, individualized goals and lesson plans were prepared. The goal-based activities are executed in the speech and language therapy sessions. The client's progress is closely monitored and depending on the progress in speech and language skills, new goals are set or recommendations are made. The child-centred approach is in practice in speech and language therapy sessions wherein parents participate actively during the session and generalize the skills learnt at home and in other settings.



Clients who have difficulty communicating verbally are trained with alternative and augmentative communication. Clients who are unable to use speech to communicate including individuals with hearing impairment, cerebral palsy, autism, or apraxia but have good hand and finger movements, are trained to communicate using sign language. Another special intervention service of the department of SHC is group sessions incorporating a transdisciplinary approach for children with multiple disabilities.

Transdisciplinary Model applied in Group session: One of the prime objectives of NIEPMD is to develop a transdisciplinary model of service delivery in the assessment and intervention of individuals with multiple disabilities. To comply with this, since 2014 department of speech, hearing and communication has initiated a transdisciplinary model in a group sessions. The goal of the group session is to enhance prelinguistic skills, early language skills, social –pragmatics, motor skill, pre-literacy skills and sensory regulation. Each session lasts for 1 hour 30 minutes and includes 25 to 30 children with multiple disabilities accompanied by one of the parents. A set of activities including sand play, bowling, ring toss, ring stand, action rhymes, identifying object/picture, naming, turn-taking & waiting during a play activity, sensory mat walk, somer sault, pulling the cart, walking in a line and so on are carried out.

II. Audiology

The audiology unit has assessment services for hearing and balance. The test includes tuning fork tests, pure tone audiometry, Speech audiometry, Immittance audiometry (Single frequency and multiple frequencies), Brainstem evoked response audiometry, Otoacoustic emission test, special tests for retrocochlear and cochlear pathologies, detailed assessment for tinnitus, Central Auditory Processing disorders test battery and vestibular evoked myogenic potential tests are carried out. Following the diagnosis of type and degree of hearing loss, suitable management options are provided. Recommendation to ENT is made for all clients. For clients with sensorineural hearing loss, Hearing Aid trials and fitting are carried out to augment their residual hearing. Hearing aids were provided at the free of cost under the ADIP scheme. At NIEPMD, 130 beneficiaries and through camps 260 beneficiaries were provided hearing aids under the ADIP scheme. Ear impressions are taken in the ear mould lab to make ear moulds and to ensure the appropriate fitment of the hearing aid. Children and suitable clients using amplification devices are provided regular Auditory training sessions in the unit, twice or thrice a week for 45 minutes. Apart from auditory training, the audiology unit also provides, tinnitus retraining therapy.

ENT Services: The department has an outpatient ENT unit for the children with disabilities as well as for the parents and the professionals. About 54 clients were assessed between April 2021 to March 2022.



Hearing Aid Troubleshooting: The hearing aid troubleshooting and maintenance services are being provided in the Speech and hearing department for various client populations. Initially, on providing a new set of hearing aid the clients are given an orientation on maintenance and usage of Hearing aids. General instructions on how to use the hearing aids, changing of batteries, the volume control, using tele coil mode, cleaning of the ear tubes and ear tips from wax, and general maintenance and care for the hearing aids are demonstrated to the clients. Troubleshooting of hearing aids is being done for over 430 clients against improper functioning of hearing aids.

Training Program on Hearing Aid Troubleshooting

- A training program on Hearing aid troubleshooting was conducted for 15 electronic engineers and a hearing aid troubleshooting kit was provided to them on 24.09.21
- The staff of Speech Dept, AVMC, Pondicherry were trained on core troubleshooting of hearing aids and Installation of hearing aid programming software on 24.09.21




Fig: 105 Beneficiaries details for the last three years

Best practices of the Department of SHC

The transdisciplinary model incorporated in group sessions is implemented by carting together Occupational therapy, Physiotherapy, Speech therapy, Special education and parents. This approach enhances communication development by simultaneously facilitating gross motor, fine motor, pre-literacy skills etc. Here the common plan is devised for the group and the targets are addressed through the play-way method. The parental participation along with the therapist is ascertained to extend the therapy activities beyond the clinical setting. The expected goals for the groups are to enhance preverbal skills, socialization skills and motor skills. The group targets to work on the set goals by including activities like taking attendance of the group for initiation followed by sand play, passing the bell, water play, bowling, rolling, hurdle race, blanket ride, ring toss, and ring

During the COVID-19 pandemic period, continuous support to our clients was provided through teletherapy. Speech and language assessments and therapy, and home training programs were provided online by video conferencing through the google meet platform.

HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

The programme offered: Bachelor in Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology (B.ASLP)College of Audiology and Communication Sciences (under the Department of SHC) runs the BASLP program since in the year 2017. The program has 4 academic years including 1 year of internship. The details of the students enrolled each year are given below. The first batch of students of the BASLP program had successfully completed the course in December 2021 and currently working in Government rehabilitation Institutes and centres, Private speech and hearing centres, hospitals, and ENT clinics.

Age/ Sex: 24 years/ Male

Diagnosis: Broca's Aphasia

Causes of Disability: Acquired

Mr. T. Balakumaran, a 24 year old adult diagnosed with Broca's Aphasia has been attending speech therapy at NIEPMD for the past 3 and a half years. His initial evaluation showed deficits in naming, spontaneous speech, reading, writing and auditory recognition. His repetition skill was good till 2 word utterances.

Therapy was focused on improving single word responses, naming skills, 'Wh' questions, repetition. Presently, he is able to execute picture description tasks, sequence short events, recall from the past, generalise tense markers, build sentences, retell a story, and express case markers. He initiates communication often and answers questions appropriately, however, needs more time to take his turn and utter the phrase/ sentence.

He has shown significant improvement in articulation. His speech is intelligible when the listener is familiar with the context. He exhibits naming difficulty and on recent Speech Evaluation the patient is diagnosed to have Anomic Aphasia.

He is now confident and happy to interact with friends and family.



SUCCESS STORY-2

Client Name: XXXXX

Age/ Sex: 14 years/ Male

Diagnosis: Dysarthria

Cause of Disability: Developmental

Yogesh, a 14 year old boy was diagnosed to have Dysarthria on 05.03.20. He has been attending speech therapy at NIEPMD for the past 2 years in online and offline mode. His initial evaluation showed difficulties in substitutions for sounds like /p/ for /v/, /r/ for /d/, /b/ for /th/, /ch/ for /s/, /t/ for /th/, along with cluster reductions, reduced phonation duration and deficit in narrative ability..

Therapy was focused on correcting articulatory e, improving breath support for speech, improving story narration in sequence and enhancing phonation duration. Correction of all the misarticulated sounds was done in the initial, medial and final positions. Once the sounds were established in isolation, generalisation to word, sentences and in conversation is carried out.

Presently the client is able to maintain adequate breath support during general conversations. The client is able to narrate story and exhibits topic maintenance. The client is now able to produce most of the misarticulated sound in word level. He has shown significant improvement in articulation. His speech is intelligible to strangers.

SUMMARY

The Department of Speech, Hearing and Communication is committed to providing clinical services to individuals with communication disorders, including comprehensive assessments of speech, language, hearing, and swallowing disorders, and provides intensive speech, language, feeding, and auditory training. The audiology lab's built-in universal design, equipped with state of art instruments for detecting and diagnosing hearing loss became functional this academic year. The Early Intervention Unit was officially inaugurated and the speech and language unit provides diagnostic and therapeutic services for children below 6 years. Teletherapy was used to provide constant assistance to our clients and parents during the COVID-19 pandemic. Speech and language evaluations and therapy, as well as home training programmes, were delivered via videoconferencing.

Faculty of Dept. of SHC also created e-content (videos) on speech and language training methods/activities for parent education and empowerment.

College of Audiology and Communication Sciences offers students a unique learning experience by providing supervised clinical practice.



CHAPTER - 9 DEPARTMENT OF THERAPEUTICS EARLY INTERVENTION

INTRODUCTION:

Early intervention provides specialized support and services for infants and young children with at-risk or developmental delays their families to help their families to participate in family and community life.

Cross-Disability Early Intervention Center (CDEIC) in NIEPMD provide services to children from birth to 6 years of age with a variety of special needs, including but not limited to: children with developmental delay and with disability. The centre will provide comprehensive group and individual Early Intervention services, Parent participation groups, Individual sessions and Preschool programs; depending upon the children's individual needs.

Cross-Disability Early Intervention Center (CDEIC) is officially inaugurated on 17th June 2021 in NIEPMD.

AIM:

- > Early identification of infants at risk and developmental delays.
- > To enhance normal development.
- > Acceleration of rate of development.
- > Acquisition of new behaviour/ skill.
- > To increase the level of independence.
- > To prevent secondary complications.
- > To support the family psychologically.

OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Screening and identification.
- 2. Intervention.
- 3. Counselling.
- 4. School readiness

BENEFITS:

- 1. About 90% of brain development occurs before 3 years.
- 2. Brain development is highly restricted after 6 years
- 3. Early intervention reduces the high risk and secondary complications.



- 4. Associate conditions and additional disabilities can be prevented.
- 5. It fosters coping with the parents' psycho-emotional status.
- 6. It promotes inclusion by improving requisite readiness skills.

I. REGISTRATION AND FACILITATION UNIT:

To orient the clients about the services offered and to enrol the new clients and follow details, UDID and Government benefits and concessions to the visitor. Organizes programs related to early intervention





II. PEDIATRIC CENTER:

To offer comprehensive health services for the beneficiary and offer pediatric services, treatment and management of childhood illness, nutrition and growth, Pediatric neurology and neurodevelopment facilities etc. The CDEIC also provide weekly/fortnightly/ monthly super medical services such as ophthalmology, E&T, Psychiatric, Neurology, PMR, Pediatric dentist, Nutritionist etc.



III. BM & COUNSELLING UNIT:


To facilitate the psychological intervention support to parents and family members of children at risk of developmental delays. This unit provides assessments and individualized and group-based behaviour modification therapy.





IV. OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY UNIT:

To offer assessment and intervention for developing, recovering or maintaining meaningful activities among children by use of self-care, play activities and assistive technology to promote and maintain health, prevent disability, increase independent function, and enhance development. Therapy to be provided both in individualized sessions and small group



V. PHYSIOTHERAPY UNIT:

To restore, maintain and maximize the strength, function, movement, and overall wellbeing of children. The individual or small group sessions are to be given for optimal physical development by means of Neuro-developmental therapy, Pulmonary Rehabilitation, mobilization exercise, stretching exercise, therapeutic exercise, postural training and gait training.



VI. SPEECH THERAPY & LANGUAGE INTERVENTION UNIT:

To help address speech, language problems and communication issues faced by the child due to her/ his disability or developmental delay Audio logical evaluation-based hearing aid will be provided, along with training for the use of hearing aid.



Alongside in individual or small-group settings, as per requirement the strategies/ techniques for drooling-control; feeding issues and oro-motor training; Auditory Verbal Therapy; Augmentative Alternative Communication; shall be used.

VII. MULTI-SENSORY INTEGRATION UNIT:

Multisensory Integration refers to how information from the different sensory modalities (such as sight, sound, touch, smell, self-motion and taste) may be integrated by the nervous system. It also deals with how different sensory modalities interact with one another and alter each other's processing.

To provide a multisensory therapeutic environment to enhance and stimulate sensory development and cognitive function.



VIII. TRANS-DICIPILINARY THERAPY UNIT (GROUP):

Trans-disciplinary group activities are the best way to deal the children with developmental delays, as peer interaction plays a major role in learning skills. The specific areas like turn-taking, Joint Attention, Imitation, Group communication, and self-control is concentrated in this along with the major units like motor, communication, socialization, cognitive, and socio-emotional skill. Parents are also involved in this intervention to emphasise the need for group intervention.

IX. SERVICES OF PREPARATORY SCHOOL:

1. PREPARATORY CLASS 1 - (3 to 4 years)

This class will cater the children with special needs (cross-disability) in the age range of 3-4 years. The education will be focused to lay an early year's foundation, through the maintenance of good health and well-being; encouraging effective communication; physical development, and personal, and socio-emotional. Readiness for learning literacy (pre-Literacy) and expressive arts and design.

2. PREPARATORY CLASS 2 - (4 to 5 years)

A group of children with special needs (10 nos.) age range of 4-5 years will attend this class, the education is focused on the development of memory, vocabulary development, fluency and clarity of expressive and understanding, readiness for learning literacy (Pre-Literacy), Readiness for learning Mathematics (Pre-Mathematics) and environmental science.




Fig: 126 Beneficiaries from April 2019 to March 202

BEST PRACTICES OF THE UNIT

SUCCESS STORY: 1

Name : S. Thaman
Age : 1 month

Diagnosis : Developmental delay

Master S. Thaman reported in NIEPMD case of 5-year 1-month baby boy presented with Developmental Delay with Hyper tone both upper and lower limb. There is no Milestone developmental for sitting, standing and walking. As he grows parents said that he is not like his brother. At the age of 3rd started to identify the problem of him at last, and they reached NIEPMD for Assessment and intervention. After the Assessment of each professional in the Early Intervention unit team, he was taken into follow-up session in each unit, he was identified as a child with Developmental Delay Child with Spastic Diplegic.





He was under regular intervention in the Physiotherapy unit NDT Facilitation techniques and other exercises, he Reduce the tightness, Joint Range of Motion, Lower trunk Stability Exercises, Strengthening Exercises, Functional Activities were given during physiotherapy intervention.

He was registered on 21.09.2021 as he was under regular intervention from that, within this 6 month of duration he has mass changes in his regular Activities.

SUCCESS STORY: 2

(CDEIC: Behavior Modification & counselling unit)

Name : Ma. Adithya

Age : 5 year 4 months

Diagnosis : Autism

Master S.Adithya was brought by his parents for a psychological evaluation to the Behavior Modification and Counselling Unit when he was 4 years 1 month of age with the presenting complaints of poor eye contact, no name-calling response, does not relate to other children, speech delay, echolalia and adamancy. The psychological evaluation reported Moderate Autism with Moderate Developmental Delay. The diagnosis was then followed by the following interventions.

- Parental psych education (1 session)
- Cognitive Stimulation (10 sessions)
- Behaviour Modification (5 sessions)
- Parental skills training (2 sessions)
- Family intervention and (1 session)
- Supportive therapy to each parent (3 sessions)

The child was re-evaluated with psychological assessments after a year as he was getting ready to take up regular school admission. According to the test findings, the child had outgrown the symptoms of Autism and his intellectual functioning has come up to the average level of functioning from the level of moderate that was found before a one year. At present, the following improvements are observed in the child.

- He can provide spontaneous eye contact with everyone including strangers.
- He has a good name-calling response.
- His speech has improved to the level of talking in short sentences. He can comprehend
 questions and give relevant replies instead of mere repetition.
- He can relate to other children, share toys and play cooperatively.
- His behaviour of adamancy has come down drastically. The mother reported no adamant behaviours are found at home.



Now, the child is attending regular school with adequate supervision and training from both the parents along with regular consultation and follow-up at the unit.




Fig: 127 Parent Empowerment Program via virtual mode

CHAPTER - 10

DEPARTMENT OF SPECIAL EDUCATION

INTRODUCTION

The Department of Special Education, National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities established in 2005 focuses on Special Education clinical services, training HRD's through various courses from diploma level, masters level and all to contribute to the holistic development of Persons with Multiple Disabilities. As per the recommendation of policies and acts which directs to develop of Human resources in the field of Special Education. Special Education is specially designed instruction to meet the needs of persons with disabilities. It follows the guidelines of various educational facilities for persons with disabilities and tries to develop the service delivery models from exclusion to inclusion, to promote community participation of persons with multiple disabilities.

OBJECTIVES

- To provide an appropriate service delivery model including Special Educational Assessment and follow-up program for individuals with multiple disabilities.
- To provide home-based programs and Integrated programs for children with special needs.
- To promote the quality of life and facilitate the clients with severe and profound multiple disabilities to live as close as possible to their family and community.
- To promote successful Rehabilitation following a Trans-disciplinary approach.
- To facilitate the transition from EI/ECSE to school programme and from school to the vocational programme.
- To develop Professional skills among Human Resources Trainees in the field of special education who will work for children with multiple disabilities at various levels & programmes
- Preparing teaching-learning materials and adaptive devices for facilitating the functions of persons with multiple disabilities is part of the program of the department.
 - To facilitate inclusive education and develop the training modules for in-service teachers and other professionals to carry out the task of inclusive education.
 - O To create the least restrictive environment by having an inclusive model classroom for children with disabilities, right from toddlers.




Fig: 132 Flowchart depicts the activities of the Department of Special Education

SERVICES OFFERED IN THE DEPARTMENT

Special Education Services



The Department of Special Education is providing Special Education services to children with multiple disabilities through assessment and follow-up programmes. The Special Education assessment is a comprehensive one which includes a detailed assessment of the developmental areas, sensory issues (in case of autism) and academic skills of particular children with multiple disabilities. This includes determining the functional level of the child such as Pre-primary, Primary and Secondary. Special Education services are provided to all clients who have congenital and adventitious conditions or disabilities. A graduated approach to identification and programme planning is necessary for children with Multiple disabilities. Special Education services will be given to the client based on the need and requests made by the parents. Once the Special



Education Assessment is done, the client will be asked to undergo follow-up services in NIEPMD. The client who cannot come to NIEPMD due to long distance will be given referral services at their places nearby.

The Special Education services of the department are divided into sub-units depending on the need and the type of disability. Supported online classes were taken through Google meet / WhatsApp calls during the COVID-19 pandemic period. The sessions were planned and scheduled based on the availability of Child, the parent and the digital device. During the online teaching session, the teachers demonstrated to the children through Google meet/WhatsApp calls and the parents guided and supported the children to complete the tasks and activities at home.

The follow-up clients undergo a detailed assessment using a functional programming checklist, GLAD, PEP 3, Callier Azuza, Carolina




Fig: 134 Assessment and follow-up programmes

curriculum and careful planning of an Individualized Education Plan by setting goals and objectives. To achieve the objective, appropriate teaching/learning strategies are developed and taught to children with multiple disabilities. The Special Education follow-up services will be given to the children with multiple disabilities twice or three in a week for about 30-40 mins. The services are need-based and individualized. The Activities such as art, craft, music, painting, fingerprinting, thumb impression and games have been conducted as part of the follow-up programme. The services included for follow-up clients in improving:

- I. Daily living skills such as brushing, bathing, dressing and eating (task analysis)
- II. Sensory activities (using a sensory kit) for children with autism, cerebral palsy with additional disabilities or blindness with additional disabilities. Functional academics for Children with multiple disabilities based on the psychological IQ assessment.
- III. Remedial Special Education services to the children with Specific learning disabilities, thereby supporting the Inclusive Education programme.
- IV. Compensatory skill training such as Orientation & Mobility, Braille, Abacus and Sign language will be given to the adults / children who need the requirement.

- 1. Strengthen IFSP (Individualized Family Service Plan)
- 2. Parent Training and Motivational Program
- 3. Action Research




Fig: 138 Beneficiaries details for the last three years




Fig: 139 Model School for children with Multiple Disabilities

Model school for persons with multiple disabilities is being organized successfully to provide the various educational and other rehabilitation services in the school atmosphere. The children registered in Model School belong to the category of multiple disabilities in varying combinations. The model school has different units. As the unit changes, the methodology of teaching and the core focus area varies based on the needs of the said group of children. The program of each child carried out in the school is well informed to the parents through conducting a regular parentteacher meeting and during daily interaction with them as parents/guardians must accompany the clients when they come to Model School.

The model school is also working as a place to provide practical exposure to trainee teachers in their concerned area of specialization. The trainee teachers of HRD programs carry out various practical assignments and research in the area of multiple disabilities in various Units of the Model School as a part of their course curriculum. The teacher-student ratio has been maintained at 1:8 with mild to moderate challengeable groups and 1:4 with severe and profound challengeable groups as it requires more special attention and facilities. About 155 children enrolled in the model school during the year 2021-22.

Early Childhood Special Education

The early Childhood Special Education Unit of Model School is focusing on children belong to age 3-6 years. In the ECSE unit, all possible combinations of children with multiple disabilities are being taken of care. Preschool education program is being imparted in the Unit through is being taken care. Preschool education program is being imparted in the Unit through which professionals prepare the child for school (School reediness program). After successful completion of this program, the unit recommends the child to study in a regular school i.e. inclusive education setup. A total of 30 children were studied in the ECSE unit in the academic year 2021-2022.

Autism Spectrum Disorder unit

Center for Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) under the Department of Special Education of Persons with ASD, the special education has initiated separate clinical services for children with ASD. This unit aims at serving children with ASD on one on one instruction, Specific assessments for ASD – PEP, APEP, TTAP, ABLLS and PECS are done to understand the goals to be achieved for the individual children. The goals are selected based on the need of the individuals and in consultation with parents. Each child attends individually to bring out utmost skill development. Strategies like structured teaching, skills along with visual schedules, PECS, etc. used for the development of communication are part of intervention planning. Customized TLMs are available in the unit for meeting the needs of children with ASD.

The children are referred to the ASD clinic after a general assessment. Each child is assessed specifically for functional skills at the ASD unit and the goals are developed for the child. Follow-up schedules are fixed considering the needs of the child and parent. Each session lasts for 45 minutes: apart from academic skills, co-curricular activities like arts, crafts, mime, drama, and play are planned for children's holistic development. Children studying in inclusive school visit unit for remedial training. Functional skills necessary for career transition are also provided.

Cerebral Palsy Unit

A total number of 28 children were enrolled in this unit during the academic year 2021-2022. The Units are divided into three levels/classes based on their age group namely: Primary (7-11 years), Secondary (12-14 years) & Prevocational (15-18 years) based on their Chronological age. A trans-disciplinary approach along with Cerebral Palsy specific intervention, along with the provision of adapted aids & Assistive technology is provided for training on mobility, communication, feeding, self-help skill and academic skills. Children's performance was assessed with standardized assessment tools; baseline assessment is done using Student Functional Assessment Profile (SFAP), and the functional assessment tools were used for assessing their specific problems like academic skills through Carolina Curriculum for preschool children with special needs, feeding skills by Eating Drinking Functional Classification System, communication skills by Communication Functions Classification System, gross and fine motor skills using Gross Motor Functions Classification System, and Handling Object Classification Systems, the overall development was assessed using Development Assessment of Young Children and in addition to that the Adapted Functional Assessment Checklist for Programming (FACP) also used. The unit supports the children with cerebral palsy with a dedicated assistive technology lab and adapted sports lab which was donated by Inner strength Trust, under CSR initiatives of Private-Public Partnerships. Children's progress is measured through these checklists and reported to parents at IEP meetings.

Deafblind unit:

The activities of the Deafblind Unit are unique as each person with Deaf blindness is different from one another to the degree of visual and hearing impairment that results in various associated problems and interferes with the growth $\mathcal E$ development of the child. The major areas are communication, accessing information, orientation and mobility, functional academics, transition



and vocational activities. Special strategies such as coactive signing and tangible symbols are used to develop communication. Tactile modes along with residual sensory abilities help to explore and learn from the classroom activities. Real-life experiences and real objects are used to develop concepts at the early education level. The children with deaf-blindness also have scheduled visits to the specially designed tactile garden. During the year 2021- 2022, 26 individuals were enrolled in the unit.

Severe and profound Multiple Disabilities (SPMD) Unit:

07 children were admitted to the Unit, all the children have diagnosed with cerebral palsy with additional disabilities like Intellectual Disabilities seizures and low vision and thus termed as severe and profound multiple disabled children. These children were assessed by the FACP care group and a severe profound program assessment checklist during their admission to see their level of functioning based on the assessment, the long and short-term goals were planned and implemented. The children were provided communication files for functional communication and



parents were provided with a home program to care for their children in functional academic, communication development, mobility, self-help skills, positioning and lifting. There are different children with multiple disabilities who were admitted to the unit.

Transition unit

A total number of 8 children were enrolled in this unit during the academic year of 2021-2022. The admitted clients were assessed with VAPS (Vocational Assessment Programming system), in that we used Generic Skill Assessment checklist during their admission to see their current level of the functional level of vocational skills. Based on the assessment, the long and short-term goals were set and implemented to lesson plans in the classroom with suitable teaching-learning material. The transition is a program in which the persons with disabilities are prepared for fitting into a new climate of the workplace from the school environment. A gradual input on the vocational program is taught to the persons with disabilities from the school program and the progress of the persons performing the assigned vocational activities is monitored. The unit focuses to identify the interest area of vocation and possible avenues and abilities of the individual to achieve vocational independence ensuring maximum utilization of the potential of the individual. The different combinations of children with multiple disabilities were admitted to the unit. Apart from the curricular activities they were also given exposure to co-curricular activities. The students do participate in the competition held in different categories such as sports, culture etc.


Helen Keller's birthday celebration:






Fig: 148 Parental Feedback on services accessibility during pandemic and postpandemic



Best practices of the department - HRD programme

The Department of Special Education is unique in the service delivery system in the country for children with multiple disabilities. The Best Practices in the services to children with multiple disabilities in the use of a multisensory approach and ICT-based teaching \mathcal{E} learning.

- Practical training: Client allotted to the trainees from services of special education department and model school to get familiarize in practical aspects such as IEP, Writing Lesson plan Task analysis, TLM preparation, methods of teaching, strategies and approach. Department insists to follow an inclusive pedagogy and a cross-categorical approach, a home-based approach for students trainees (D.Ed & B.Ed)
- Interdepartmental activities for a holistic approach for students to be well equipped in the area of disability and special education. Students from Diploma, UG to PG level are given exposure to observe the interdisciplinary department and its services. Frequent visits to OT, PT and Psychology department
- Research and development activities: PG students (M.Ed scholars) are exposed to research – dissertation-related activities. The undertaking researches are further for paper presentations and publication during their second year. This is an extensive learning experience.
- Educational tour: visiting various institutes in different places arranged by the department for the student trainees to develop their interest and understand the existing programme. Besides internships were given to B.Ed/D.Ed trainees in inclusive and special Schools.
- Seminar, workshops: seminars & workshops, special lectures organized by the department for students to provide hands-on experiences
- Competitions, Festivals celebrations: i) Department organize cultural programmes, festival celebrations and activities for students during Pongal, Deepavali, Christmas etc ii) students are allowed to participate in national days such as vigilance awareness week, Hindu diwas.

An External Examiner is employed to evaluate the performances of the trainee and every Passed out is awarded a Certificate on successful completion of the Course.






3. Career Guidance and Placement

Eligible clients are counseled on the Job Potential and the clients thus identified are referred to various Job fairs notified in and around Chennai. Parents are sensitized to 4 percent job reservations for Persons with Disabilities. They are also supported in Online & Offline registration for the notified jobs.



4. Home-based follow-up

The Clients on account of lockdown could not attend offline classes and hence the Online training programs were introduced and made compulsory to ensure the services. The said Online training programs were facilitated through Voice Calls and Video Calls.



5. Vocational Guidance

Clients are given guidance on Appropriate Vocational training programs of DAIL with exclusive counseling about the opportunities available under various types of employment such as Open, Self, Sheltered and Supported employment





6. Job Coaching

The gazette notification on 4% Job Reservation CG-DL-E-13012021-224370 dated 7th January 2021.

A novel initiative of Job Coaching to strengthen the candidature of clients facilitating to avail the ensured 4% job reservation. The said training program focuses on my preparation for Competitive Exams. The Program gained much receptivity and appreciation and to date, 72 clients benefitted through this Online Job Coaching Program of DAIL.

SIPDA skill training & Entrepreneurship programme was introduced in the year 2016 at DAIL, as a viable entrepreneurship programme for PwDs ensuring a meaningful life with economic independence for PwDs. Under the subject, out of 8 approved courses five courses namely Domestic Data Entry Operator, Hand Embroiderer, Sewing Machine Operator, Animator, and Housekeeping Attendant (Manual Cleaning) were commenced with a total strength of 50 adults with Special needs. Out of the 8 approved courses of SCPwD, 5 courses started this year under the scheme of SIPDA and 50 Adults with Special Needs are benefitted from this scheme. The training duration is of 400 hours based on the curriculum as designed by Skill Council for Persons with Disabilities. The programme has drawn exceptional identity and much response as well the demand is witnessed and thus, the SIPDA programme is undoubtedly a constructive curriculum bearing prospering scope. Because the syllabus includes the market potential and technique.

According to Section 34 of the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (RPwD) Act, 2016, every appropriate government shall appoint in every government establishment, not less than 4% of the total number of vacancies in the cadre strength in each group of posts meant to be filled with persons with benchmark disabilities of which, 1% each shall be reserved for persons with benchmark disabilities. In this connection, the release of Government Gazette notification CG-DL-E-13012021-224370 dated 7th January 2021, clarifies the various posts eligible for Persons with Disabilities. DAIL supports its beneficiaries in registering for suitable posts notified by various governmental organizations as and then. Notifications of job requirements are also circulated among the registered beneficiaries through WhatsApp groups.

CHAPTER - 12 DEPARTMENT OF MEDICAL SCIENCE SOCIAL WORK

INTRODUCTION

Social Work Unit emphasises the innovation, meaningful participation and promoting an inclusive society by empowering the individuals, families and community to utilize the resources and to facilitate changes aimed to empower the persons with disabilities by using various Social work methodologies: Casework, Group work, Community Organisation, Development, Advocacy and Research. Social work also involves delivering appropriate services by networking with DPOs, NGOs, Universities, Colleges, Schools and other government bodies.

BEST PRACTICES

Social workers traditionally use a series of steps or processes to help clients with disabilities resolve their problems. While building a relationship among the worker, the client, and the client's environment (engagement), collecting information about the client (assessment), making sense of the information (diagnosis), doing and the work that will enable the client and the practitioner to accomplish the goal decided upon in the assessment (intervention) and determining whether the process has been helpful (evaluation).

Social Work follows often a fluid circular process whereby professional social workers move from assessment to intervention and evaluation and back to assessment again.

CASEWORK (STRENGTHS-BASED SOLUTION-FOCUSED APPROACHES)

Solution-focused practise concentrates on helping people move towards the future that they want and to learn what can be done differently by using their existing skills, strategies and ideas— rather than focusing on the problem. Solution-focused practice Social work intervention with individuals and families was carried out by social workers having specialization in psychiatric social work and the aim was to assist individuals with disabilities and their family members to survive copying with the impossible, foster resilience or enable them to begin to build platforms of support that could improve their lives. In the year 2021-22, a total number of 2587 individual casework was carried out.

GROUP WORK (TASK-CENTRED WORK PRACTICE)

The most common forms of group work are with people having mental health difficulties, young carers, children, teenage mothers, children or individuals with physical and intellectual disabilities. In this type of intervention, the social workers use their collective experience and expertise to share effective solutions, provide mutual support, and promote esteem confidence and identity. In the year 2021-22, a total number of 85 beneficiaries were taken for group work. Each session (7 sessions) consisted of 12 beneficiaries for a year i.e. 84 sessions.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Where problems such as environmental poverty, high unemployment rates and poor housing, are affecting a community, particularly sons with disabilities, social work intervention and a community development approach are necessary, so in this regard, the following activities are undertaken a community development

EARLY SCREENING CAMP

Early screening campaign takes a closer look at that child's development, leading to timely identification of disability and resulting in children with special needs receiving extra help sooner preventing from them being behind. COMMUNITY-BASED INCLUSIVE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME (CBID)

CBID programme aims to create a pool of grass-root rehabilitation workers at the community level who can work alongside ASHA and Anganwadi workers on cross-disability issues disability issues and facilitate the inclusion of persons with disability in the society. In this regard, the Community-Based Inclusive Development course was inaugurated virtually by the Secretary, Ministry of Social Justice on 31st October 2021. The CBID course is developed by the Rehabilitation Council of India (RCI) in collaboration with the University of Melbourne, Australia. NIEPMD enrolled 17 students in the first batch of the CBID programme and the course was started from 16.09.21

SERVICE AND PROGRAMME UNIT

The service and programme aim to provide suitable rehabilitation services to the Persons with Multiple Disabilities and Uni disability which includes registration, detailed analysis, referral, psycho-education, the orientation of schemes, programme \mathcal{E} amp; benefits, respite care and short term Continuous Rehabilitation Education programmes. It is designed to minimize the impact of disabilities \mathcal{E} amp; attain rehabilitation goals, thus facilitating equal access and opportunity.

BEST PRACTICES

Based on the rights-based approach, promoting, protecting and ensuring the full and equal enjoyment of all human rights and fundamental freedoms by all persons with disabilities, and in turn, promoting respect for their inherent dignity.

Services and programmes by liaison with all the departments and Units of NIEPMD striving hard to promote removal and inclusion including health, rehabilitation, assistance and support, environments, education and employment sectors.



The service and Programme unit coordinate rehabilitation services. Based on the type of disability (Multiple disabilities and Unique disability) this unit provides individualized services and it is designed to minimize the impact of disabilities and to attain rehabilitation goals, thus facilitating equal access and opportunity for the disabled.

An outbreak of novel coronavirus disease was declared by World Health Organization in March 2020 a severe pandemic which result in a lockdown. As the lockdown was lifted and slowly things started getting back to the pre corona period, services and programmes swung into action and worked out strategies to engage and sustain the development of individuals with disabilities, some of the activities services and programmes carried through tele-based rehabilitation services. A total number of 250 beneficiaries were provided with tele-based rehabilitation services.

REGISTRATION

Registration of new clients was done by the support staff at reception by collecting all the details of the client and categories them into UD or MD. The clients were sent to Rehabilitation Professionals for Client Situation Analysis. The staff at reception also guide the clients to other departments for further treatments and follow-up sessions and also receive inter-office calls, and outside calls and guide them appropriately about our services, availability of cottage and other services provided at the institute.

Social Work professionals educate the parents/caregivers about the condition of the client and explain the management plan to avail the services at NIEPMD as well as the home-based learning programmes. CRE programme is basically to upgrade the knowledge and skills of in-service and practising rehabilitation professionals/personnel, registered with the RCI u/s 19 of the RCI Act of 1992, and also to update the professional knowledge and skills of master trainers working in the field of disability rehabilitation and special education.

In the year 2021-22 32 no. of CRE programmes were conducted in the form of the webinar and a total of 5373 professionals participated, the details are mentioned below;



LEGAL GUARDIANSHIP

A guardian is a person who is appointed to look after another person or his property. He or she assumes the care and protection of the person for whom he/she is appointed the guardian. The guardian takes all legal decisions on behalf of the person and the property of the ward. The occasion for taking care of another person may be his minority that is, a person who has not completed 18 years of age. It can also refer to the guardianship of a person who because of physical and mental deficiencies is unable to take care of himself or his property. From early times, the condition of minorities has been the ground for the appointment of guardians in all societies. In this regard, NIEPMD, Services & Programme in association with Swastik Trust (an NGO authorised to collect the application form and process) is processing the application of the beneficiaries towards Legal guardianship. OTHER EVENTS CARRIED OUT:

SUMMARY

Social Work pro-actively worked intending to improve the well-being of persons with disabilities and their family members and empower them through social work intervention, social workers offer intervention to individuals, families and groups which enable them to meet their needs and issues. The main purpose of these interventions is to aid clients in alleviating problems and improving their well-being Social workers should think creatively about interventions that may be helpful to the individuals, couples, families, and groups or communities they serve. Social Work at NIEPMD carries out a Community based Inclusive Development programme to create a pool of grass-root rehabilitation workers at the community level who can work alongside ASHA and Anganwadi workers to handle cross-disabilities issues and facilitate the inclusion of persons with disabilities in the society.



Services and programmes enhance the quality of life for persons with disabilities and their family members by extending service to families, community, policy development, advocacy and research in liaison through the various units and departments of NIEPMD and also by networking with other institutions and organizations. Services and programmes coordinate with rehabilitation services which include registration, and client situation analysis apart from that also function with respite care, CRE, research and helpline. Every year number of beneficiaries are benefitted in the aspect of resourcing, empowering, knowledge and therapy. Various training and awareness programmes are conducted to reach the maximum population.



CHAPTER - 13

EXTENSION & OUTREACH SERVICES

INTRODUCTION

A large number of persons with disabilities living in rural, far-flung, and remote areas do not get the attention that the persons with disabilities living in urban areas get. To make the services available - evaluation, assessment, diagnosis, therapy, fitment, counselling, and creating awareness, Outreach and Extension services are provided by NIEPMD. In line with NIEPMDs work to promote new strategies to reach persons with disabilities of the different age groups of different categories with different needs. NIEPMD Extension Centres started functioning at the following three places:

- Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development, Sriperumpudhur, was Established on 18th September 2016.
- Chengalpattu Medical College, Chengalpattu.
- Supportive assessment services to State Govt. of Tamil Nadu for Issuing Disability Certification (SRTC)

A team of a multidisciplinary team equipped with diagnostic equipment and fitment aid provides services by camping in rural and far-flung areas. Also, they guide local NGOs in the rural areas, in setting up service centres, pre-schools & Vocational training centres. NIEPMD supports, (Technical support on need and expertise based on a consultancy basis) distribution of Aids and Appliances under ADIP Scheme, Parent Training Programmes, Short Term Training Programmes (Seminar, Conference, Workshops, Training programmes, Awareness programmes, Conducting Special events for children/persons with disabilities, Special programme (PMSTP/SIPDA/R&D/HRD) for SC/ST/North East Regions, etc. It is ensured from the technical side to make the Extension Centre function to the fullest by engaging skilled manpower in the centre and providing well-structured quality services to the clients.

OBJECTIVES:

- To provide access to various services for long-distance clients.
- To expand the service of NIEPMD.

ACTIVITIES OF THE EXTENSION AND OUTREACH

- Providing rehabilitation services for persons with disabilities (Spl. Edn/Physio Therapy/ Occupational Therapy/Psychological Counselling/Speech Therapy/etc)
- Imparting various training programmes for PWDs and their parent.
- Organizing various Short-Term Training programmes for clients with disabilities and their families.



- Conducting various co-curricular activities and extracurricular activities for PWDs.
- Providing Aids and Appliances for PWDs.
- Conducting awareness programme, capacity building programme, empowerment and community mobilization of PWDs and their families.
- Documentation and record-keeping.



To end this stereotypical situation and emphasise the importance of mental health in our society, the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment and the Department of Social Justice and Empowerment of Disability (DIVYANGJAN), Government of India have launched Kiran-Mental Health Rehabilitation Helpline (24*7) Toll-free number 18005990019 in 13 regional languages with 660 professionals across India on September 7, 2020, to provide support to people facing anxiety, stress, depression, suicidal thoughts, and other mental health concerns.



CHAPTER - 15 INFORMATION AND DOCUMENTATION CENTRE:

Library:

NIEPMD Library has a unique collection of 7804 information resources in the form of CD-ROMS, E-Journals, E-Books, Books, Braille Books, Journals, theses and reports related to Multiple Disabilities. All students, faculty members and employees of the Institute are entitled to make use of the Library facilities by taking library membership. The Library has a rich collection of books on various disciplines of Disability wise Special Education, Deafblind, Hearing Impairment, Visual Impairment, Clinical & Rehabilitation Psychology, Vocational Training & Rehabilitation, Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy, Speech & Communication, Intellectual Disabilty, Autism, Cerebral Palsy & Education. A user-friendly SOUL 2.0 (Library management software) and barcode scanner were adopted in the library to automate the library management work. NIEPMD Library also has a lifetime membership in the National Digital Library of India (NDLI), developed by the Indian Institute of Technology, Kharagpur, and Sponsored by the Ministry of Education. The Students and staff can access more than 48,984,683 books through this portal.

RTI Act 2005

NIEPMD has implemented the Right to Information Act 2005 as per the norms of the Central Information Commission, the Government of India and the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan). The Right to Information Act 2005 (RTI) is an act of the parliament of India to provide for setting out the practical regime of right to information for citizens to secure access to information under the control of public authorities, in order to promote transparency and accountability in the working of every public authority. The Central Public Information Officer headed by the Director of the Institute who is the appellate authority is responsible for providing information. The Public Information Officer serves as the liaison officer and handles correspondence with the authorities concerned. The institute received 82 RTI applications during the year 2021-22 and replied to the queries within the stipulated time. The quarterly returns pertaining to RTI are filed and submitted to Central Information Commission online as per the prescribed guidelines.

Public Grievances

During the year 2021-22, 62 Public Grievances were received through the online Grievance portal. The reply has been prepared and sent to the complainant.





Fig: 196 Graphical representation of Students Enrolled

Best practices are followed in conducting Examinations and Evaluations during COVID-19 -pandemic situations.

- a. Online Google Meet was conducted with National Institutes (operating NBER) and RCI to set the strategy for conducting Examinations and Evaluations.
- b. Google meet was conducted with the Teacher Training Institutions conducting Special Education Courses.
- c. NBER initiated Payment Gateway to receive the following payments from Teacher Training Institutions and candidates attending Examinations.
 - 1. Incidental Charges
 - 2. Students Enrolment fees
 - 3. Examination fees (Theory/Practical's)
 - 4. Certificate correction fees
 - 5. Retotaling, Revaluation fees,
 - 6. Transcript Fees
- d. The examination Schedule was posted on the website well in advance.
- e. State Nodal Officers, Central Level Observers, Center Superintendents, Invigilators and Support Staff were involved in conducting Examinations/ Evaluation.
- f. Chief Coordinators of RCI-Zonal Coordinators of ZCC were involved in the conduction of Examinations and Evaluations.
- g. Google meeting was conducted with Nodal officers and ZCC members of NBER RCI.



- h. National Institutes, CRC centres, Government Colleges and Private Institutions were identified as Exam Centers (based on the Topography and Distribution of the Students attending Examinations)




Fig: 201 objectives of the CSR department




Fig: 203 Services Offered




Fig: 204 Projects have been carried out during the year 2021-22



ADDITIONAL FINANCIAL SUPPORT TO STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

Students pursuing their studies at NIEPMD hail from economically weaker family background. With a major portion of the meagre income from the head of the family being spent on the monthly expenses for the treatment of disabilities of the student or their family members, they struggle to manage other expenses. They cannot afford to spend more on education and facilities that aid studies. The differently abled also face many other issues with respect to pursuing their studies. Realising their hardships, NIEPMD provided additional financial support in the form of scholarship to its students with the help of its CSR Partner, United Way, and Chennai.



Students pursuing B. Ed. (Special Education), M. Ed. (Special Education) and Diploma in Special Education in NIEPMD are getting benefited by the scholarship. So far, the said scholarship has been granted to 21 (twenty one) students. The list of beneficiaries is given below:

Our CSR project focussed on the nutrition factor through the distribution of Health Mix. NIEPMD in collaboration with Mobiz India Foundation Limited, distributed nutritious health mix to all children with special needs at Model School in NIEPMD to boost their immunity and health.

The health mix is made as per traditional wisdom with millets blended to perfection along with cereals and pulses and contains 60 enriched ingredients which enhance the Metabolism and IQ Level of children. The main objective of this collaboration to reiterate that "Good health requires nutritious food". And we strongly believe that such initiatives will pave the way for a healthy future generation. Under this CSR project, a total of 508 beneficiaries were provided with nutritious health mix. Thus we were able to achieveour sustainability goal (i.e.) betterment of children with disabilities and their future development.



In collaboration with SMART Foundation, NIEPMD provided nutritious health mix to tribal groups in Chengalpattu. This CSR initiative was accomplished in the month of January 2022. Around 80 tribal people living in and around NIEPMD campus at Chengalpattu were benefitted from this initiative.




Fig: 214 International Workshop on Needs of Gifted Children


WORKSHOP TO PROMOTE E-LEARNING

Individuals with disabilities were unable to meet their monthly household requirements because of Covid-19 lockdown. Many lost their jobs and could not find suitable alternative employment. They were struggling to make end meet. As a timely help to PWDs and their families, NIEPMD along with its CSR Partner Hyundai Motors supplied monthly provisions and other basic necessities to such families along with financial support.

BURSARY

Supporting persons with disabilities to achieve economic independence is the chief and vital focus of NIEPMD. Our understanding that education plays a prominent role in nurturing independence, gave way to undertaking an initiative of providing scholarships in collaboration with B. Braun, Chennai.Offered Rs.1,75,000/- (Rupees One Lakh and Seventy-Five Thousand Only) worth of financial support to students pursuing various courses within the campus of NIEPMD. This bursary was granted to PWDs and children belonging to economically weaker sections, especially kids who lost their parents due to COVID-19.



SETTING UP 3-D PRINTING TECHNOLOGY LAB

The Rights of Person with Disabilities Act (RPWD), 2016 enlists Twenty-one (21) types of disabilities including locomotor disability. This highlights the importance of providing aids and assistive devices to various categories of PWDs. Prefabricated prosthetic and orthotic items are easily available and less expensive than customised products. However, only tailored products having unique characteristics provide adequate fit which is the most essential in creating value and user satisfaction.



In the typical manufacturing procedure (Subtractive Method), a patient visits the rehabilitation team to initiate the process of measurement, designing, fabricating, fitting and alterations. This rudimentary method is time consuming, laborious and increases the cost. In contrast, 3-D Printing Technology is based on Additive Technology which reduces the number of visits by user and minimizes human error (Prosthetist & Orthotist). This digital technique enhances customisation thereby providing the best comfort and maximum user satisfaction.

An orientation programme was conducted regarding the RPWD Act, 2016with special focus on the accessible environment to be created for PWDs, other amenities, recruitment process, reservation in employment and promotion of the differently-abled. Emphasis was laid on roster system to be followed during the pandemic.

The day long programme was conducted in two batches (27.12.2021 and 28.2.2022) for the employees of CPCL - 36 human resource personnel were part of the first batch and 40 members belonging to the DGM cadre attended the second batch. The said sessions were facilitated by Advocate Dr.Abinaya.S.M.



LEGAL CELL

Legal cell - a first-of-its-kind initiative was the brainchild of Advocate Dr.Abinaya S.M. was set up to provide legal advice and assistance to students and other PWDs with respect to all legal matters, especially for retention of their rights and seeking remedies. The council also proved to be beneficial to HRD students, parents of children with special needs, service clients and NIEMD staff and persons falling under the marginal income group.

Consultation is available to overcome stress and handle legal matters in appropriate manner so that they approach the Court and seek orders at the right time. The main aim of the legal cell is to empower women and PWDs by creating awareness regarding their rights and encouraging them to seek remedies.




Fig: 224 Flagship projects2019-20

SUCCESS STORIES

1. PARAMESHWARAN

A classic example to show that the NIEPMD CSR team extends a helping hand beyond NIEPMD by supporting differently-abled students from other colleges. Mr. Parameshwaran is from Pachaiyappas College. He is visually challenged, hailing from a remote village from a feebler economic background. He doesn't have a father. His friends and relatives helped him complete B.Ed. in NIVH, Poondhamallee. When he was struggling for financial support to pursue M.A. Tamil Literature, CSR unit of NIEPMD supported Parameshwaran with financial assistance for tuition fee and hostel fee. With constant support and guidance from the CSR unit and Legal cell of NIEPMD, he has been able to clear UGC NET exam.

2. ARUNA KUMARI

Mrs. Aruna Kumari recently completed her M.Phil in Clinical Psychology. She has received scholarship of Rs.2,40,000/-during this financial year for completing the course . Her father is a daily-wage labourer and she has married a visually challenged person. Managing her husband, household and studying simultaneously was a huge challenge for her.She found it very difficult to pay fees for pursuing her Masters degree. Based on the recommendation of NIEPMD's CSR Unit, our CSR partner United Way, Chennai came forward to pay her tuition fee for two years at one stretch. Aruna expressed her gratitude and reiterated that without this scholarship,completion of the course and obtaining her degree would have been impossible. She assured that she would definitely help PWDs come up in life and work for empowerment of the differently-abled community. She also added that for a person like her belonging to a poor economic background and pursuing studies was supported by the family, friends or relatives, this scholarship is indeed a gift from God!

3. MRS. PRAMILA

The curious case of Mrs. Pramila began in the year 2017 when Pramila, aged about 42 years, a resident of Thiruvannamalai filed a Maintenance case against her husband Mr. Muralidharan for a monthly allowance for maintenance of Rs.25,000/- per month for herself and their daughter. After complete trial, the Court ordered her husband to pay a monthly allowance of Rs.20,000/- per month on or before 5th day of every month. The allowance was payable from the date of presentation of main petition to date of filing this execution petition (i.e.) 04.0.2017 to 17.09.2021. 54-month allowance is payable to her. Meanwhile, her husband filed appeal against the said order, before the Honourable High Court of Madras. However, no order has been passed by the High court against the maintenance order till now. During this time, he paid only 25,000/- to Mrs. Pramila as arrears in maintenance amount.

Mrs. Pramila is residing with her aged mother and her minor daughter, a child with multiple disabilities. Her daughter has already undergone heart surgery and continues to take treatment. Mrs. Pramila and her parents have spent more than Rs. 3 lakhs for the surgery, but her husband never gave a single penny. Mrs. Pramila was struggling to survive and has been dependent on her mother, brother and sisters. Despite being in a salaried job and well off, her husband is willfully neglecting her and their child.



While Pramila was neither in a position to hire a good lawyer nor file an execution petition due to her family circumstances, the Legal Cell of NIEPMD came to her rescue. The Legal cell of NIEPMD filed an execution petition and helped her get the maintenance amount regularly as ordered by the Court. Mrs. Pramila and her family stated that they had made payment to lawyers by pledging their jewels, but there had been no improvement in the case over the last 5 years. The first time Mrs. Pramila has received cash from her husband as maintenance has been made possible with the able support of NIEPMD's Legal Cell. What more could she ask for? This has been a blessing in disguise!




Fig: 1 Beneficiaries details for the last three years

Client Registration, Assessment, Diagnosis, Action Plan and Therapeutic Intervention CRC-A&N islands

CRC A&N Islands has a unique way of functioning and the new clients are guided to the social work department for the preliminary data collection about the client i.e, identification and demographic data, presenting complaints, history of the present illness and treatments, Family history, personal history pre and post-natal history, history of immunization and developmental history. After the preliminary data collection, the clients are led to the various departments as per the need of the client and an initial assessment is conducted in each of the departments.

Initial assessment and detailed assessment are conducted in one or two sessions and it depends upon the cooperation of the client. Based on the diagnosis, an action plan is prepared in which the goals according to the present functioning of the client are set up i.e., short-term goals and long-term goals.

Weekly once or twice therapeutic sessions are provided to the client as per the need of the client and periodical evaluations and Interdisciplinary meetings are conducted to assess the improvement of the client.




Fig: 3 Beneficiaries details for the last three years

COMPOSITE REGIONAL CENTRE FOR SKILL DEVELOPMENT, REHABILITATION AND EMPOWERMENT OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES (DIVYANGJAN), (CRC-SHILLONG)

INTRODUCTION

Composite Regional Centre for Skill Development, Rehabilitation and Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (Divyangjan), (CRC- Shillong) located in the Meghalaya at Montfort Brothers Building, Dhankheti, Shillong, is a service institution set under the administrative control of National Institute for Empowerment of Person with Multiple Disabilities (NIEPMD), Chennai, DEPwD, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment (MSJE), Govt. of India; with the aim of creating and developing resources and services required for Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) in the State of Meghalaya. The Government of India has set up CRCs in different parts of India, especially in the North-Eastern States. CRC at Shillong is the 20th such institution and has become functional since July 19th 2021.

Apart from providing clinical services, this organisation is involved in creating awareness, developing resources and materials, conducting outreach programs, and implementing schemes of the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment.

In order to expand our services, Cross-Disability Early Intervention Centre (EIC) will be started shortly, exclusively for children up to 6 years of age for early identification and therapeutic intervention of disabilities.

OBJECTIVES:

- To serve as a resource centre for rehabilitation and special education of persons with disabilities.
- ii. To undertake human resource development by training rehabilitation professionals, village level workers, multi rehabilitation workers and other functionaries in Govt. and non-Govt. sector, required for providing services to persons with disabilities.
- iii. To undertake public education programmes for the creation of awareness amongst the parents and the community.
- iv. To undertake designing, fabrication and fitment of aids and appliances.
- To undertake services of education and skill development leading to enhancement of opportunities for employment, rehabilitation, mobility communication recreation and integration in society.
- vi. To undertake research and development with specific reference to the needs of diverse groups of people with disability, keeping in view the nature and severity of disability in the region.
- vii. To develop strategies s for the delivery of rehabilitation services suitable to the sociocultural background of the region.
- viii. To stimulate the growth of services by encouraging and supporting voluntary organizations parent groups and self-help groups.



ix. To establish linkages with existing medical, educational and employment services following the principles of community-based rehabilitation and offer extension services in the rural areas.

CHAPTER - 22 ACCOUNTS AND FINANCE DEPARTMENT

Preamble

Accounts department plays a pivotal role in achieving the objectives of the NIEPMD by providing a reliable framework that consistently, produces accurate financial information.

Objectives

- To provide a basis for performance assessment of NIEPMD.
- Budgeting gives a framework to coordinate and develop the different segments of NIEPMD.
- To highlight the key performance indicates; to submit financial projections and comparing past performance.
- To place necessary internal controls within NIEPMD for the safeguarding of its resources.

Out of the total grants-in-aid of Rs.38.38 crores received from DEPwD, MSJ&E, New Delhi during the year 2021-22 (NIEPMD – Main a/c Rs.33.26 crores, CRC – A & N island Rs.0.62 crores, CRC - Shillong – 0.31 --crores, CRC-Kozhikode Rs.4.19-- crores) and Rs.19.32 Crores brought forward from the previous year (totalling Rs.57.70 crores), the Institute could utilize Rs.42.76 crores leaving a balance of Rs.14.94 crores (NIEPMD-Main A/c Rs.7.28-- crores, SIPDA Rs.0.29-crores, ADIP Rs.4.90 --crores, CRC-Kozhikode Rs.2.47-- crores CRC- A&N island Rs.0 --crores and CRC - Shillong Rs.0-- crores) as on 31st March 2022.

In terms of section 20(1) of C&AG's (DPC) Act, 1971, the CAG, New Delhi had entrusted audit of the Annual Accounts of NIEPMD for a period of 5 years from the financial year 2006 -2011, an extended period of 5 years from 2010 -11 to 2015 -16, again an extended period of 5 years from 2016 -17 to 2020 -21, and also extended further period of 5 years from 2021-22 to 2025-2026, vide letter No. F. L. NO. N-802/4/2021-NI dated 27.05.2021 from U/S (Report), Department of Economic Affairs (Budget Division) Ministry of Finance to the controller and Director General of India, New Delhi for auditing the Annual Accounts of NIEPMD.

For the financial year 2021 -22, the audited statement of accounts comprising of accounts statement, balance sheet, Income & Expenditure statement and receipts and payments details which were submitted to the Director General of Audit (Central), Chennai. The audit team was deputed by the Director General of Audit (Central), Chennai visited NIEPMD for an audit from 22.08.2022 to 01.09.2022. The audit Report, Audit Certificate and certified accounts of the institute for the Financial Year 2021 -22 were received from the office of the Director General of Audit (Central) vide letter No: PDA(C)/CE/I/28-71/2022-23/74, dated 28.10.2022

Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India on the Accounts of National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities, Chennai for the year ended 31 March 2022

- 1. We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities, Chennai as at 31st March 2022, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date under section 20(1) of the Comptroller & Auditor General's (Duties, Powers and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971. The audit has been entrusted for the period up to 2025-26. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Institute's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.
- 2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting, standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc., if any are reported through Inspection Report/CAG's Audit Reports separately.
- 3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.
- 4. Based on our audit, we report that:
 - i. We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit.
 - ii. The Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipt & Payment Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format approved by Government of India, Ministry of Finance.
 - iii. In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities Chennai as required in the rules and regulations of the Institute in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.
 - iv. We further report that:

A. General

- 1. Partial/Non consolidation of transactions of CRC Kozhikode into the main accounts of NIEPMD, Chennai has resulted in understatement of Capital Fund by ₹0.53 crore, Current Liabilities by ₹0.83 crore, Current Assets Bank Balances by ₹0.53 crore, Income by ₹2.62 crore and Expenditure by ₹2.17 crore.
- 2. As per Form 65, deposits with CPWD was ₹8.12 crore and Work-in-progress was ₹2.81 crore. Whereas as per annual accounts, deposits with CPWD in Schedule 11 Current Assets, Loans and Advances was ₹14.33 crore and Work in progress as per Schedule 8 Fixed Assets was Nil. Differences in figures between Form 65 and annual accounts were not reconciled.
 - Further, within the Schedules forming part of Balance Sheet, deposits with CPWD was shown in Schedule 11 Current Assets as ₹14.33 crore, where as per schedule 7 Current Liabilities it was ₹21.24 crore. The difference was not reconciled.



3. Provision for retirement benefits was not made on the basis of actuarial valuation as prescribed in accounting standard 15. In the absence of actuarial valuation, the sufficiency of provision of ₹1.18 crore made in accounts could not be verified.

B. Effect of revision in accounts

Accounts of the Institute were revised on the basis of audit observations. As a result of revision, Assets and Liabilities increased by ₹0.71 crore surplus reduced by ₹1.44 crore.

C. Management Letter

Deficiencies which have not been included in the Separate Audit Report have been brought to the attention of the Institute through a management letter issued separately for remedial/corrective action.

D. Grants in aid

The institute received ₹38. 38 crore as grants-in-aid for the year 2021-22 and an unspent balance of ₹19.32 crore of previous year was available, totaling to ₹57.70 crore. Out of this, the institute could utilize a sum of ₹42.76 crore, leaving a balance of ₹14.94 crore as on 31st March 2022.

- v. Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & payments Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.
- vi. In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the said financial statements read together with the Accounting policies and Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in Annexure to this Audit Report give a true and fair view in conformity with Accounting principles generally accepted in India.
 - a. In so far as it relates to the Balance Sheet, of the state of affairs of National Institutes of Empowerment of persons with Multiple Disabilities, Chennai as at 31st March 2022; and
 - b. In so far as it relates to Income & Expenditure Account of the deficit for the yearended on that date.

Dear Sir,

Please refer to the Separate Audit Report on the audit of annual accounts of the National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities, Chennai for the year 2021-22 issued on 28.10.2022. I wish to bring the following defects noticed in the accounting practices/procedures to your attention for remedial action.

- 1. As per Annual Accounts Schedule 17, interest earned on SB A/c of SIPDA was ₹,7,84,146. Whereas per ledger and bank records, it was ₹52,169. This needs to be ₹reconciled.
- 2. Rates of depreciation adopted by NIEPMD, Chennai Main office were different from the rates adopted by CRC, Kozhikode in respect of Assets viz, Buildings, Computers & Peripherals and Library Books. Depreciation on Tools, plant & Equipment has been calculated at 10 percent against the 15 percent prescribed in Income Tax Rules. This has resulted in understatement of Depreciation and overstatement of Fixed Assets by ₹19,05,004.
- 3. Accounts of CRC-Kozhikode has been prepared in 3 sets, CRC-Kozhikode main, ADIP and SDP. Since ADIP, SDP are only projects, they should be accounted under 'earmarked funds' instead of preparing separate accounts. CRC- Shillong and Andaman were also removed from Schedule 3 of the main accounts and separate set of financial statements have been prepared, which Is not consistent with previous year's accounting practice. Transactions of all the CRC's under the control of NIEPMD, Chennai should be consolidated into the main accounts, though appended separately.
- 4. In Schedule 7 the head 'Advance with CPWD' needs to be renamed as 'unutilized grant advance with CPWD'


