National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities under Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt.of India was established in 2005 at ECR, Muttukadu, Chennai, Tamil Nadu, to fulfill the objective of serving as a National Resource centre for empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities such as those with two or more disabilities in one person. The enumerated disabilities as per PWD (1995) Act are. Low vision, Blindness, Locomotor disability, Hearing Impairment, Mental Retardation, Mental Illness, Leprosy Cured persons, and as per National Trust (1999) Act, Cerebral Palsy and Autism. #### **CHAPTER 1**

**ANNUAL REPORT 2014 - 2015** 

#### INTRODUCTION

The Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, Govt. of India is working for the empowerment of persons with disabilities since its inception. This Ministry is serving the disabled through its seven National Institutes situated all over the country that functions, by evolving service delivery models, conducting awareness, sensitization and HRD programs, undertaking research & development, providing assistive devices and livelihood for Persons with Disabilities (PwD). In the year 1980. The United Nation declared decade for disabilities (1982-1992), which led to the emergence of the most of the National Institutions. These Institutes started earlier, were working for the Persons with Disabilities of different individual categories (single disabilities). The decade between 1993 - 2002 was declared as the Asia Pacific decade of the disabled persons. Further extended as extension of Asia Pacific decade for the disabled 2003-2013.

This decade led to the emergence & implementation of the PwD (1995) Act and the National Trust (1999) Act in India. After the implementation of National Trust (1999) Act, focus was given to Multiple Disabilities and there arose a need to start a National Institute exclusively for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities. To fulfill the above, National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities (NIEPMD) came into existence in the year 2005. This Institute is situated in a beautiful ambience on East Coast Road (ECR), Muttukadu, Chennai, which is 35 kilometers away from the Chennai Central Railway station. Since the inception in 2005 the services for Persons with Disabilities for single as well as Multiple disabilities at NIEPMD has been given on an out-patient basis through a multi-disciplinary team model, besides the cottage – services and extension services.

The Census of India, 2011 enumerated data on eight types of disabilities including first time entry of multiple disabilities. This data gave a picture of prevalence of multiple disabilities in the Country and guide path to NIEPMD in planning various services of rehabilitation for this group of society. Census data, 2011 on disability shows that there are 2.68 crores persons are with disabilities in India, which constitute 2.21% of the total population, out of which 21.16 lakhs belong to the



category of multiple disabilities. One of the objectives is to ensure all human rights to disabled, persons specially to those who need more intensive support i.e. persons with multiple disabilities.

During the year 2014-15 various activities for the empowerment of persons with multiple disabilities were initiated with reference to INCHEON Strategy by "MAKING THE RIGHTS REAL" for Persons with disabilities. The said 10 goals of Incheon strategy were taken as a guiding principle to carry out the various programme throughout the year.

Under HRD programme 109 students undergoing training in 6 courses at various level starting from Diploma to M.Phil course. 2nd National Level sports meet for Diploma in Special Education Trainees was organized from 16th to 18th January 2015 at NIEPMD & Tamil Nadu Physical Education & Sports University, Chennai. Shri.W.I.Devaram, IPS, Director General of Police (Retd), President - Tamil Nadu Athletic Association was the Chief Guest. During this year special attempt was made to reach the unreached in various parts of the country such as Port Blair, orientation programme for the staff members of Lakshadweep for a period of 3 months. 6 Research projects initiated by the Institute completed during the reporting year.

As a special initiative collaborative work started vigorously with various stake holders. Dr.Nishith Rai, Vice Chancellor, Dr. Shakuntala Mishra State university, Lucknow visited NIEPMD on 2<sup>nd</sup> May 2014 in order to support NIEPMD for a centre of excellence. On 25<sup>th</sup> August 2014 Hon'ble Minister Smt. Uma Devi. Women & Child Development, Govt of Odisha and Smt.Kasthui Mohapatra, State Commissioner for Persons with Disabilities, Govt of Odisha, visited NIEPMD to establish CRC Bhubaneswar.

Attempt made to disseminate information on Multiple Disabilities for a wider target group population during this year in the form of books, awareness materials & brochure. 1. Book on Deafblindness 2. Souvenir on Multiple Disabilities 3. Handbook on hearing aid 4. Handbook on Multiple Disabilities in Assemesse language.

Keeping in view the magnitude of population of Multiple Disabilities out of the identified person with disabilities (Census 2011) a special drive was made to reach the unreached beneficiaries across the county. Extension centre were opened under outreach programme in the following places; Vanagram, Chennai (Tamil Nadu), Annanagar, Chennai (Tamil Nadu), ICF Chennai (Tamil Nadu), Mehatava, Kalpakkam, (Tamil Nadu), Gudalur, (Tamil Nadu), Bhadrachalam, (Telangana) Agartala (Tripura), Gantok (Sikkim), Imphal (Manipur).



UN Theme: for the year 2014 on International Day of Persons with Disabilities includes " Sustainable development : The promise of Technology" was fulfilled by organizing a Conference on Assistive and Rehabilitation Technologies in collaboration with Confederation of the Indian Industry, TNPC, Chennai on 22<sup>nd</sup> August 2014. Similarly a conference with RMKU- Coimbatore organised with the title National Seminar on Assistive Technology in Education & Sports for Total Inclusion of Persons with Disabilities on 6<sup>th</sup> - 7<sup>th</sup> February 2015.

On 29<sup>th</sup> January 2015, the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Social Justice & Empowerment under the Chairmanship of Shri. Ramesh Bais along with team of Members of Parliament both Rajya Sabha and Lok Sabha visited NIEPMD and reviewed service availability for persons with Multiple Disabilities. Similarly a special effort was made for a meeting that was held with various state holder in Chennai to review the amendments need to be made in the proposed Rights of Persons with Disability Bill.

In order to provide a better facilities for Persons with Multiple Disabilities, foundation stone was laid by Hon'ble Union Minister Thaawar Chand Gehlot for constructing a Hydrotherapy Pool and Athletic Track in the premises of NIEPMD. Special programmes were organized to mark the Swachh Bharat Mission for clean India.

In order to reach the services activities for Persons with Disabilities in North Eastern states NIEPMD organized various programs such as Sports Meet for Persons with Disabilities, Workshop, ADIP camps, Awareness programs, Training programs for Rehabilitation professionals and Film Festival at Sikkim, Assam, Meghalaya, Tripura, Arunachal Pradesh, Manipur & Mizoram and also started the extension centre at Sikkim & Manipur.



# Chapter 2 Organizational Structure

National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities is an Autonomous body under Department of Persons with Disabilities, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment(MSJ&E), Govt. of India registered under The Tamil Nadu Society Registration Act 1975 (Tamil Nadu Act 27 of 1975) bearing Registration No: 59/2006 dated 23rd October 2006.

The Secretary, MSJ&E, is the President of General Council (GC) and Joint Secretary (Disability Division) is the Chairperson of the Executive Council (EC). The Director, NIEPMD carries out the activities of the Institute under the guidance of the GC and EC.

#### Role and function of the General Council:

- I To consider the Annual Report.
- ii. To consider the Balance Sheet and the Audited Accounts for the previous year.
- iii. Receipt and consideration of budget proposals for the following year.
- iv. Such other matter or matters as the President may direct.
- v. The President, General Council presides over all meeting and moves the Executive Council to take into consideration to the views in regard to any matter, which is required to be considered.




# 2.3 Academic Committee:

# ADMISSION PROCEDURE

During the academic year 2014-15, admission notification for the M.Phil (Clinical Psychology), PGDEI, B.Ed. Spl. Edn (MD) and Diploma courses, was published in dailies viz., The Hindu & Daily Thanthi on 18<sup>th</sup> May 2014 for admission. The admission notification was uploaded in the NIEPMD website. The applications received for Diploma were scrutinized and the eligible students were called for interview on 10<sup>th</sup> July 2014, and the provisionally selected students were instructed to take admission on or before 14<sup>th</sup> July 2014.

For B.Ed. Spl. Edn (MD), the applications received were scrutinized and the eligible students were called for interview on 7<sup>th</sup> August 2014, and the provisionally selected students were instructed to take admission on or before 13<sup>th</sup> August 2014.



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# Chapter 4 Services

#### Services:

Providing suitable rehabilitation services to both the persons with Multiple Disabilities and single disabilities including the clients coming with impairment is one of the primary functions of NIEPMD. This rehabilitation services are coordinated by the Department of Social Work, through Service and program section. The service & program section is having two wings called registration and case history taking unit. The registration unit makes registering the clients and providing necessary information about the institute to the clients and visitors. The registration unit also receives the calls from outside and giving appointments and other information through phone to the general public.

#### **Case History taking**

The case history taking unit is managed by the Professional Social worker where the Social worker will take the detailed first-hand information about the client & their family, covering Antenatal care, Postnatal care, family history, developmental history, immunization covered, school history and family dynamics. This unit also collects the registration charges and service charges as per the NIEPMD fee structure. Once the procedure of case history taking process is over then the client will be guided to other departments for specific assessment and intervention. Apart from regular services, NIEPMD also conducts special clinics viz., Neurology, Psychiatriy and Dental care on every month. The Institute also supplies medicines to persons with disabilities for Neurological and Psychiatric conditions.



In the year 2014-15, 7979 clients were registered at NIEPMD and its extension centre. About 2648 were Persons with Multiple Disabilities and 5331 were persons with various types of single disability were registered and 56556 clients were received various rehabilitation services (follow up) at NIEPMD and its extension centre. Among those clients 37820 were persons with Multiple Disabilities and 18736 were Single Disabilities. Since NIEPMD follows the policy of

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




Fig3: Follow up session

## 4.1 Dept. of Physical Medical Rehabilitation

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The Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation aims at diagnosing the different conditions that are seen in Persons with Multiple Disabilities. Even persons with single disability when analyzed is found to have associated conditions. Persons with peculiar syndromes were investigated. It was found that apart from chromosomal abnormalities and genetic disorders inborn errors of metabolism is also causing Multiple Disabilities. A few rare disorders like Fabrys disease, Glucoronic aciduria, Glu-T deficiency were reported during the year. The Speciality clinics viz. Psychiatry, Neurology, Ophthalmology & Dental Clinics are conducted regularly in a month. These clinics have helped the clients to solve their problems. Two clients were referred for surgery to the government hospitals for Urinary retention and swelling in the chest respectively. One client recovered his eyesight after the quick reference to Sankara Nethralaya Eye Hospital for cataract that occurred due to injury. A client with Neuroblastoma received free investigations from the government general hospital.

The units which come under this department includes, Early Intervention, Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy, and Prosthetic & Orthotic Unit. Antiepileptic and Anti-psychotic drugs are dispensed to the needing clients. 10% of the cost of Medicines is being collected so as to ensure that the clients taking the medicines regularly. The details of clients benefitted during the year 2014-15 are as follows.

#### 4.1.1. Early Intervention Unit:

The Unit for Early Intervention is rendering services to client with multiple disabilities below the age of 3 years. Special activities are provided to the children to develop cognition, sensory perception, emotional & social development and motor development. In sensory stimulation visual training paved way for the development of

eyesight in very young children. Neuro developmental therapy helped many children to gain their motor milestones. Parents were trained to feed their children without producing choking. TLM materials were given to the parents to work with their children at home. Early Inventionist in this unit working as a trans-disciplinary person imparting various skills. This unit was also a good lab for PGDEI students. The details of clients for the year 2014 -15 as follows.

#### 4.1.2. Physiotherapy Unit:

Physiotherapy is a one of the modern branch in medical science. In this treatment techniques include,

- Thermotherapy: Based on treatment with heat
- · Hydrotherapy: Based on treatment with water
- Cryotherapy : Based on treatment with cold
- Electrotherapy: Based on treatment with Electrical modalities
- Exercise therapy: Based on treatment with exercises which includes manipulation and mobilization

In our institute (NIEPMD) above mentioned therapy are provided for clients with disabilities. The major unit of services in physiotherapy department at NIEPMD are

- i. Neuro Developmental Therapy
- ii. Electrotherapy And Gait Training
- iii. Virtual Training
- iv. Pulmonary Rehabilitation

**Neuro-developmental Therapy:** In this unit the clients are treated with exercises like neuro developmental approaches, weight bearing exercises and positioning. Specialized therapy programs are also provided to clients with brain damage and to rehabilitate their motor functions.

**Electro Therapy And Gait:** Here therapeutic modalities are used for rehabilitation and pain management. It includes array of equipment's of different frequency for intervention. Gait rehabilitation is also provided with gait training area which includes parallel bar, postural mirror, treadmill, static bicycle, ergometer etc.,

**Virtual Training:** Virtual training is provided with a virtual environment in which the client is a participant in the virtual medium, through this program the goals of rehabilitation are achieved.

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**Pulmonary Rehabilitation:** Pulmonary rehabilitation is provided for clients with respiratory problems. Rehabilitation program are provided to the clients to improve their ventilatory function.

Physiotherapy also has their own method of diagnosing with special tests and preventive method for certain conditions. The clients are also suggested for appropriate adaptive devices and home programs as per their conditions. Physiotherapy Department places a major role in rehabilitation of persons with disabilities.

#### 4.1.3. Occupational Therapy Units

Occupational Therapy is one of an essential unit in the rehabilitation setup to provide maximum functional ability and enhance clients' independency in activities of daily living by doing purposeful and productive activities.

The main focus of occupational therapy aims at improving the functional abilities of the client, including both gross motor and fine motor skills, achieving developmental milestones, enhancing the

cognitive-perceptual abilities and activities of daily living skills.

Clients attending occupational therapy services are subjected to initial evaluation, followed by goal setting and treatment implementation. Regular monitoring of progress of the clients is observed and documented.

Clients with Multiple Disabilities, Cerebral palsy, Mental Retardation, Autism Spectrum Disorder; Attention deficit hyperactive disorder, Learning Disability, Orthopedic and Neurological Disorders, Geriatric Conditions, Psychiatric conditions and other developmental disabilities are benefited by Occupational therapy unit service in NIEPMD.



Approximately **925** clients per month are benefited by Occupational therapy services which are provided by 3 specialized professionals.

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Occupational therapy unit had submitted the proposal to establish their services in Psychiatry, Hand Splinting, Activities of Daily Living unit and Recreational Activity unit In the near future, after establishment these new units, the numbers of beneficiaries are expected to be peaked up to 1600 clients per month. In addition, our professionals participated in Extension Center Services, identification and materials distributions camps under ADIP scheme. Prescription of splints & adaptive devices for clients with neurological impairment is also done. Fitting of the splints, the wearing schedule & the maintenance of splints are explained to them. Realistic goals of individual clients are met through Occupational Therapy services.

#### 4.1.4. Prosthetic & Orthotic Unit:

Prosthetics implies the science dealing with artificial replacement of lost body part either congenitally or due to amputation which included total limbs, fingers, partial hand, partial foot, eyes, nose, ear, etc.

Orthotics implies the science dealing with mechanical correction of orthopaedic deformities, realignment, and recorrection of lines of force action in the body, support of weak parts, prevention



of unwanted movement, measurement for prosthesis and orthosis, fabrication for prosthesis and orthosis. Fitment and training for orthosis for individual clients has been done.

Prosthetics and orthotics is the rehabilitative modality that deals with the people affected by orthopedic and neuromuscular disorders, insufficiencies including congenital loses and accidental or traumatic amputations. It helps the persons with disabilities re-achieve the dignity, esteem and self sufficiency. It enables the individual, once again, to view the world with positive attitude with new found independence.



#### 4.2 Department of Clinical Psychology:

The department of Clinical Psychology executes the rehabilitation services by performing psychological assessments and providing interventions based on psychological principles. Standardized assessment tools are used to assess the development / intellectual functioning of the individuals, which helps in planning the education and therapeutic programs of them. Apart from that, assessments for higher Cognitive functioning, Specific Learning Disability, Personality tests, Neuropsychological and Psycho-diagnostic assessments are done to assess the various psychological profiles of the individuals.

As part of the interventions, Behaviour Management is provided for those individuals to reduce maladaptive behaviour and to improve adaptive behaviour. Further, Cognitive Enhancement techniques are provided to improve the cognitive functioning of the persons with disabilities. The department ensures the involvement of family members during the therapeutic sessions, which enables them to observe, learn and implement the same techniques at home. Cognitive rehabilitation and psychotherapy are also provided for various behavioural and emotional problems of persons with multiple disabilities and to the family members. Neuropsychological rehabilitation is also provided for clients with cognitive distortions and for head injury sequel.





Psychological Assessment of a client

On accomplishing the objectives of NIEPMD, the Department of Clinical Psychology functions with the target of developing human resources in the field of disability; providing rehabilitation services and taking up research projects pertaining to the field. As part of the same, M. Phil Clinical Psychology, a two year speciality program is being conducted where eight trainees had enrolled, making four trainees per year. The trainees are provided with clinical supervision and training in performing psychological assessments and interventions under the trained supervisor. Apart from regular lectures, various academic programs including topic discussions, case conferences, journal clubs, general seminars and movie clubs are being conducted in the department to ensure quality training for the trainees. Further, the trainees of the first year were been posted in other institutes like, Institute of Mental Health, SCARF and The Banyan for additional inputs in enhancing the knowledge towards psychiatric conditions. The second year trainees are posted at Voluntary Health Services, for three months to avail training in the psychological issues of the patients related to the general medical conditions.

Apart from that, the department is also involved in handling theory and practical classes for Diploma, Post-Graduate Diploma and B. Ed., courses. Added to this, graduate and post graduate



students from other colleges were also been trained ranging for a period of one week to one monthas part of their internship programs. Various short-term training programs were also conducted to enhance the knowledge of rehabilitation professionals.

The department also organized a week program as part of 'World Mental Health Day' from 10<sup>th</sup> – 16<sup>th</sup> October 2014, comprising the following programs:

- Puppet Show & Magic Show for children with disabilities along with regular school children
- Mental Health Awareness Program for the House-keeping staff and security personnel of NIEPMD
- Invited talk on Mental Health Issues for the Guest Faculties and Supporting Staff of NIEPMD
- Two Days Workshop on Cognitive Assessment for Disability Rehabilitation for post graduates pursuing psychology from other colleges
- A panel discussion on the 'Role of Social Media in Depicting & Promoting Mental Health' for the general audience. The panelists included a Psychiatrist, Behavioural Catalyst, Writer and a Film Maker. The details of clients benefitted during the year 2014-15 as follows.

## 4.3 Dept. of Special Education:

Special Education, being part of providing rehabilitation for a holistic development of PWD's this department's activities imbibes all the areas that are specially designed to suit each individual with multiple disabilities who receives the services. The initial assessment and related services are given systematically. The trans-disciplinary service being in practice, each child enrolled for follow-up as well as in the school receives a comprehensive educational program. The research projects and generation of human resources are also carried out for a evidence based cross-disability approach in training. Innovative technologies using assistive technologies and appropriate indigenous teaching learning materials are prepared to support the training in the centre & also for home bound program. Remedial education also plays a vital role in our planning to facilitate Inclusive Education. Regular school teachers are included, in the rehabilitation team for suitable training.

Model School for persons with multiple disabilities is being run successfully to provide various educational and other rehabilitation services in the school atmosphere. The clients registered in the Model School belong to the group having children with multiple disabilities of various combinations. The program of each child carried out in the school is well informed to the parents by conducting regular parent teacher meeting and during daily interaction with them as it is mandatory that parents/guardians should accompany the clients to the school.

The Model School also provides an opportunity to the trainee teachers to gain practical exposure in the field of disabilities. Trainee teachers of HRD programs conduct various practical assignments and conduct research in the area of multiple disabilities in different units of the Model School as a part of their curriculum. The teacher-student ratio has maintained as 1:8 with mild to moderate challengeable group and 1:4 with severe and profound challengeable group and this atmosphere requires more special attention and facilities. About 132 children with Multiple Disabilities had enrolled in the model school during the year 2014–15.

## 4.3.1 Early Childhood Special Education Unit:

Early Childhood Special Education unit of Model School is focusing on the children belong to the age of 3 to 6 years. In ECSE unit all possible combinations of children with multiple disabilities are being taken care. Preschool education program is being imparted in the unit through which professionals prepare the child for school (school readiness program). After successful completion of this program, the unit recommends the child to study in regular school i.e. the inclusive education setup. A total of 22 children were enrolled in ECSE unit for the academic year of 2014-15.

#### 4.3.3 Deafblind with additional disabilities Unit:



The Deafblind Unit is unique as each person with Deafblindness is different from the other as the degree of visual and hearing impairment varies and because of association problem that interferes with the development. The major areas that are given importance are communication, information, functional academics, transition and vocational activities. Special strategies such as coactive signing, tangible symbols are used to develop communication. Tactile mode with residual sensory abilities helps to explore and learn from the classroom activities. Real life experiences, real objects are used to develop concepts in children in early education level. The Deafblind students are also exposed to specially designed tactile garden. There were 20 enrolled in the unit during 2014-15. Apart from the curricular activities they were also given exposure in co-curricular activities. The students do participate in competitions held in different categories such as sports, cultural etc.,

ASD Unit has admitted 38 children having autism with additional disabilities. The unit is further divided into three sections viz. Primary, Secondary, & Transition. The age range that is assigned to each section is 6 to 10 years for primary, 10 to 14 years in secondary & 14 to 18 children in transition. During the admission, the children were assessed with childhood Autism Scale Rating (CARS), Psycho Educational Profile (PEP's) and Functional Assessment Checklist for Programming (FACP) tools for identifying their current level functions and implementing the individualized educational program. Apart from the curricular activities they were also given exposure in co-curricular activities. The students do participate in competitions held in different categories such as sports, cultural etc.,

#### 4.3.5. Savare and Profound Multiple Disabilities Unit:

There are 10 children admitted in the unit, with the diagnosing conditions like cerebral palsy with additional disabilities including mental retardation with seizure, low vision and hearing impairment. These children were assessed with FACP care group and severe profound assessment checklist during their admission to see their level of functioning. Based on the assessment, the long and short



term goals are planned and implemented. The children were provided individual care during their visit to the Unit and IEP were implemented. Each child was provided communication files to do functional communication and parents were provided with home program to care their children in functional academics, communication development, mobility, self-help skills, positioning and lifting. There are different combination of children with multiple disabilities were admitted in the unit.

#### 4.4 Department of Speech, Hearing & Communication:

The Department of Speech, Hearing and Communication provides rehabilitation and habilitation to the children and adult having hindrance in auditory and communication skills. The departmental activity includes providing a complete audiological test battery protocol for the children, comprehensive communication assessment, evidence based intervention and hearing aid trail & fitting.

The intervention provided in the department preliminarily focus on the trans-disciplinary



approach where the therapy is predominantly child centered. The speech pathologist work along with allied professionals and provides an inclusive early intervention therapy for children below three years. Later the speech therapist, special educators, communication instructors along with other rehabilitation professionals work together and provide group as well as individual therapy for children with multiple disabilities. The speech therapy services are extended to the model school where in the school speech therapist work along with the special educators to enhance the communication in the classroom setup. The department provides evidence based therapy for children with various childhood communication disorders and also helps to manage the drooling & feeding difficulties. The department also provides home based therapy services where in the parents are given demonstration of the activities that enhances the communication skill of the child by joint action routines by extending to the home environment. Furthermore, it extends its services to the regular and inclusive schools by identifying the children at the risk of developing language disorders, language learning difficulties, fluency and voice disorders.

School screening programmes : School children are being screened for the presence of speech, language and literacy problems by speech therapist.

The department is not only involved in providing auditory verbal therapy for children with hearing impairment but also teaches Indian Sign Language for the adults and children who needs and appreciate the alternate mode of communication. It is intensively involved and had extended its audiological rehabilitation services not only at southern part of India but also at the northern and eastern part of India, by conducting identification camps and distributing the BTE hearing aids under ADIP scheme for the hearing impaired adult and children. The department has contributed largely to credit of first national institute to initiate distribution of BTE hearing aid under ADIP scheme. It also serves the purpose of maintenance of hearing aid dispensed and auditory verbal therapy to be provided by parents at home, by explicitly explaining the procedures of the same and distributing manuals along with hearing aid for the further reference.



Apart from the clinical services to the children and adult, the department is also involved in human resource development programs by providing Indian Sign Language classes for the allied professionals at the institution, training and guiding students of Bachelors in Audiology and Speech Language Pathology and Masters of Rehabilitation Science hailing from various other organizations. Furthermore, it has been actively drawn in conducting CRE programs to the rehabilitation professionals.

#### 4.5 Department of Social Work:

The Department of Social Work is a viaduct between the departments of the institute and the clients coming for various services. All the clients registered for the services are observed thoroughly by the department. It also provides counseling and guidance to the clients to visit various departments in order to get the necessary services. The department also refers the clients to the appropriate departments of NIEPMD and various organizations outside NIEPMD for providing holistic care and services to the clients. This department also enlightens the parent on various schemes and programs for the family members having persons with disabilities and also educates the parents on the procedure to avail the schemes and programs for the family are also been suitably intervened by the social worker by applying social work methods to help them to cope-up with the problems more successfully. The department also provides comprehensive diagnosis report about the family member having disability and means to handle the problem in an effective manner.

#### 4.5.1 Mobile Services:

The department of Social Work is also conducting mobile services on regular basis to identify the persons with disabilities residing within 50 kms radius of NIEPMD. Two qualified rehabilitation staff were engaged to carry out the mobile services. The objectives of the mobile services are as follows,

- 1. Identify the clients with disabilities at the earliest possible.
- 2. To explain the parents/family members about the disability.
- 3. Educate the parents in management of the persons with disabilities at the home and community level.
- 4. Link the clients with NIEPMD and nearest service providers for availing suitable services.
- 5. Orient the family members about the disability identity card and various schemes and programs available for persons with disabilities.
- 6. Provide suitable aids and appliances for the persons with disabilities at the community level

Besides the individual services, the team also conducts awareness creation programs about the prevention and early detection of disabilities. The details of the clients registered through mobile services are given in the below tabulation.



#### 4.5.4 Family Cottage Service:

The service of family cottage is provided to the out station clients those who seek NIEPMD for services. This facility is provided on the appointment basis and it is availed by the clients for a period of 7 to 10 days. This provision gives the clients and their family to reside at NIEPMD campus for a short-term period, helping the client to get assessed, counseled and to plan the home-based programs as per the recommendations of the professionals. A total of 94 persons with multiple disabilities along with their family have been provided the family cottage service in the year 2014-15 and the charges are being received from the clients as per the NIEPMD norms.

#### 4.5.5. Respite Care Centre:

Respite care is the provision of short-term, temporary relief to those who are caring for family members who might otherwise require permanent placement in a facility outside the home.

Respite care centre is a planned short-term and time-limited breaks for families and other unpaid care givers of children with a developmental delay and adults with an intellectual disability in order to support and maintain the primary care giving relationship. Respite care also provides experience for the person receiving care.

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#### Income Generation Programme (IGP)



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


Fig. 7 Details of Beneficiaries under PM's Skill Development Programme-2014-2015-Cagetory Wise







Fig. 8 Details of Beneficiaries under PM's Skill Development Programme 2014-2015-State wise

## SUCCESS STORY- 1

Baby Lakshana, 4 year old female child affected with developmental delayed in milestone came to NIEPMD for Physiotherapy Unit for assessment. Though she had the ability of crawling & kneeling for more than 10 minutes, she was not able to stand properly, unable to maintain trunk stability in half kneeling, trunk bending activities and also had pelvic instability & inco-ordination.

#### Intervention Strategles:

- NDT approach has been followed in Physiotherapy Department(NDT unit)
- Soft tissue kneading, Positional stretching, Joint compression & approximation, Manipulation was done in preparatory face.
- Different positioning was done and facilitated the muscle by encouraging the child to be more active and play therapy methods of exercises were given.
- Posture correction, gait training, balance training, treadmill training, and cycling exercises were also given.

#### Improvements:

She has been treated since 18/12/2013, twice in a week for a session with 45 minutes. She was engaged in positioning, half kneeling, worked on trunk stability, raising from half kneeling to standing, one leg standing, sit-to-stand from the squatting position and gait training was given in the treadmill to improve the walking speed. At present she is able to do half kneeling, coming to stand from squatting position without support and able to walk independently with minimal support.



#### SUCCESS STORY- 2

Baby Shamina Hameed, 4 year 11 months old, active and cooperative girl. She came to Occupational Therapy unit for a detailed evaluation to find out the problems relevant to occupational Therapy.

She is diagnosed as a Cerebral Palsy associated with MR and low vision. Her gross motor, fine motor, oromotor, cognitive-perceptual skills, ADL skills, and play skills were not age appropriate.



Occupational Therapy interventions were scheduled for her above mentioned problems that included Play therapy, NDT, Roods approach, Biomechanical approach, along with other various O.T handling techniques.

Through the interventions she achieved the following skills: upper limb-proximal stability, trunk control skills, oromotor skills to a satisfactory level. Now she can maintain sitting with self-supported and she started exploring in and around her premises through modified creeping. Her hand function skills are improving satisfactorily like grasping the objects, lifting the toys for playing, holding the crayons for colouring, etc. She is exploring the near placed objects by using her tactile sense touching. Her cognitive perceptual skills are started showing satisfactory changes. She is



actively assisting and cooperating in basic self-care ADL skills like brushing, eating and grooming skills. Oro-motor skills like chewing, biting, swallowing functions are showing satisfactory changes, drooling problems were satisfactorily reduced through the above mentioned functional activity.

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As part of the World Disability Day celebration sports events were conducted where, she participated in bean bag

lifting event and received prize from the Chief Guest Dr.V.Vishwanathan.

Her progresses in play skills areas are showing satisfactory changes (near age appropriate). Eg Self exposure to playing object, reaching, grasping and manipulating toys. Proper home program was given to the parents to achieve her age appropriate development.



## SUCCESS STORY- 3

Master Praveen Mahajan Aged 4 year and 2 month diagnosed as Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) came for an Occupational Therapy unit. Initial assessment revealed that, he had the chief complaint of poor eye contact, attention and concentration, communication, socialization skills, poor academic skill development with behavioural issues. Through the evaluation it was revealed that he had significant sensory modulation, processing, discriminative, registration problems in visual, auditory, tactile, vestibular and proprioceptive skills. He lacks in social communication, social interaction and imaginative plays skills. After the initial evaluation he was referred to Sensory Integration therapy unit for Occupational therapy service.



Sensory Integration Approach (S.I), Cognitive Behavioural Approach (CBA), and Behaviour Modification Approach were scheduled as part of OT interventions. In addition, he received Visual Stimulation on the same days to minimise his visual motor integration issues. Through the above mentioned Occupational Therapy service, he got significant improvement in his sitting tolerance level. His attention span got increased to a remarkable level and more over his improvements were evident with active participation, cooperation during the therapy session. Now he to complete the assigned activities for nearly 10-15 minutes (sitting tolerance, concentration) without getting distraction. Furthermore, he started to mingle with other children (peer group interaction) during scheduled therapy time and he was showing satisfactory changes in his motor planning skills. He exhibits marked improvement in his basic ADL skills and play skill development. By seeing these satisfactory changes, it is advised to his parents to do regular behaviour modification approach in home environment. It is also recommended to the parents to encourage the child to involve in day to day activities with active participation.



## SUCCESS STORY 4

Master Vasanth, 2 year old boy came to NIEPMD in June 2014. He was diagnosed as a child with Muscle problem, Low vision and not responding to touch. He was only lying down on the bed. With the help of Neuro-developmental therapy and SMILES training he achieved the following milestones. He could hold his neck, turned neck to sides to look at his mother. His eye hand coordination also improved. He began to vocalize when he started attending speech stimulation regularly. Vasanth, became very friendly with all the persons in the unit and recognizes them. He calls for help, when he wants anything. Creating 5 smiles per day in the child and his parents was the goal of the Early Interventionist.





#### Scheme of Assistance to Disabled Persons for Purchase / Fitting of Aids and Appliances (ADIP) Services

The Institute is providing Aids and Assistive Devices for Persons with Disabilities under the scheme of Assistance to Disabled Persons for Purchase/Fitting of Aids/Appliances (ADIP Scheme) of the Government of India. The requirement for providing aids/appliances, which are essential for the social, economic and vocational rehabilitation of the disabled persons, has come into sharp focus, particularly after the enactment of the Persons with Disabilities (Equal Opportunities, Protection of Rights and Full Participation) Act, 1995, which came into force in 1996.

The main objective of the scheme is to assist the needy persons with disability in procuring durable, sophisticated and scientifically manufactured, modern, standard aids and appliances that can promote their physical, social and psychological rehabilitation, by reducing the effects of disabilities and enhance their economic potential. The aids and appliances supplied under the scheme shall conform to BIS specifications to the extent possible. The scheme also include under its ambit, medical/surgical correction & intervention, which is essential prior to fitment of aids and appliances.

The Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India has selected this institute as one of the implementing agencies for distribution of assistive devices to disabled persons. The Assessment and Distribution camps were organized as per the need and requirement of the community. The National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities (NIEPMD) organized camps at various places as well as centre for the implementation of ADIP scheme of Government of India in which 13686 aids and appliances were provided to 6953 persons with disabilities during the reporting year 2014-15. The details are as follows

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#### Research & Development

Research and development is one of the important aims and objectives of the Institute. The institute conducts research in the field of rehabilitation of Persons with Mulitple Disabilities (PwMDs). The faculty members of the various departments are actively involved in carrying out research projects aimed to provide quality care to the Persons with Multiple Disabilities. The institute encourages such projects by providing intramural funding and other infrastructure. The Academic committee has been formed to provide guidance for the Research projects. The details of the research projects thus undertaken are as follows:-

# 1. Existing service provisions for Persons with Multiple Disabilities in India- A database compilation

Persons with Multiple Disabilities do have a combination of various disabilities that may include: Physical mobility, mental retardation, visual, hearing and other associated disabilities. Thus there is a need to have a data bank pertaining to the existing services and service models available in the whole country.

Duration of the project is 3 years and the estimated cost of the project is Rs. 10 lakhs and it is carried out in the department of Social Work. An amount of Rs. 7, 74,000/- has been spent for this project till date.

#### Aim:

To provide a compiled data base of the existing organizations, institutes rendering their services for persons with multiple disabilities in India.

#### **Objectives:**

- To compile and categorize the address of the organization/Institutions(s) working for persons with multiple disabilities.
- 'To compile information pertaining to the services available to persons with multiple disabilities all over India.

• To review information pertaining to the service delivery models available for persons with multiple disabilities.

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- To refer the outstation cases to the organization/institute(s) for long term rehabilitation.
- To assess the needs of the NGOs to provide effective services for persons with multiple disabilities.

#### Expected outcome:

- Data bank of list of organization/institution(s) providing services for persons with multiple disabilities.
- District wise directory of organization/institution(s) will be documented.
- To compile nationwide data for further research
- To develop unique service delivery model at NIEPMD
- Networking with NGO's working in Tamil Nadu and other states.
- Publication and presentation.

## Current status:

- A total of 223 organizations details spreading across the country have been collected
- Verification, editing and compilation of the collected data are in process.
- Proof reading, final printing format and designing of the directory are in the process.

# 2. Technology Adaptation for Persons with Multiple Disabilities having Multi-Sensory Impairment in Skill training set up through Mechatronic devices

The Department of Adult Independent Living, NIEPMD with the Support of Department of Science and Technology (DST) under the scheme Technology Interventions for Disabled and Elderly (TIDE) initiated a project, titled "Technology Adaptation for Persons with Multiple Disabilities having Multi-Sensory Impairment in Skill training set up through Mechatronic devices".

As known training adult in skill training setup particularly in persons with Multiple Disabilities, needs proper planning and adaptation, to bring out the maximum output. Keeping this in view, the said project was instigated in the Department of Adult Independent Living (AIL). This devices mainly



works on the main principle of stimulation to the tactile sense. By this method the individual are conditioned to perform the basic need activities in skill training setup independently. Similarly the same procedure was established for generalization in home environment.

This project was funded by Department of Science & Technology. The duration of the project was for two years with a sanctioned cost of Rs. 3 Lakhs. The outcome of the project was evaluated in the review meeting held at Hyderabad on 10th January 2014. The outcomes are:

- Development of a prototype.
- This devices work on the main principle of stimulation to the tactile sense.
- This devices work on the basic of stimulation to the sense organs
- Work on learning principles
- Bracelet type gadget
- Operation key board with switches for keys for On /Off
- Dc volt and solar operated
- Cost effective
- Easy to handle

# 3. A study on ventilatory pattern, parameters and intervention for the clients with spastic quadriplegic cerebral palsy

Patients with quadriplegia have immense changes in ventilatory pattern. There seems to be a similar motor deficit in spastic quadriplegic cerebral palsy. Hence, there arises a need to assess their ventilatory parameters and find out whether there is a respiratory compromise. Duration of the project is 3 years and estimated cost of the project is Rs.5 Lakhs.

#### AIM:

To study the ventilatory pattern, parameters of clients with spastic quadriplegic cerebral palsy, to design an interventional protocol for the same.

#### METHODOLOGY:

This study was designed to be conducted in phased manner,

- 1. Identifying suitable clients meeting the inclusion criteria.
- 2. Assessing the ventilatory parameters using computerized spirometer.

- 3. Comparing the value of respiratory parameters with normal subjects.
- 4. To find out the area of short fall and device appropriate pulmonary rehabilitation protocol.

Initial evaluation was done for 40 clients of which 20 is in experimental and 20 is in controlled group. Therapeutic program for the experimental group was given.

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The pulmonary training includes,

- 1. Breathing exercises
- 2. Active exercise to shoulder/shoulder girdle
- 3. Thoracic expansion exercises
- 4. Diaphragmatic strengthening exercises etc.

These exercises were given for a period of 6 weeks with intermittent testing for pulmonary volumes and capacities in the 3rd week. Data analysis for 40 clients (20 experimental and 20 controlled groups) has been done.

#### **Result**:

The study indicates that the pulmonary values have improved for clients with spastic quadriplegic cerebral palsy by providing pulmonary rehabilitation.

#### Outcomes:

Pulmonary rehabilitation is involved one part of therapeutic service. This study is presented in International (SAACC) Conference as a research study to the scientific community.

#### Current Status: Completed

 Study of sleep patterns in children with multiple disabilities and its effect in day to day functioning.

#### Introduction:

Clients with Multiple Disabilities are often having problems in getting smooth sleep. The lack of sleep produces inattention, irritation and interferes with learning. Hence, study of sleep patterns and treatment of sleep disorders will help the clients to overcome the above difficulties. Duration of the project is 3 years and an amount Rs.7.5 Lakhs has been allocated for this project.



#### Aim:

To record the sleep pattern of 50 clients with Multiple Disabilities and to analyze the pattern of sleep and give intervention.

#### Expected outcome:

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The clients who are suffering due to inadequate sleep will be made to have a sound sleep and thus reducing the irritability and enhancing the quality of life. This will also help in giving proper treatment for children with multiple disabilities who are suffering from sleep disorders.

#### Current status:

30 children with multiple disabilities and with problems with disturbed sleep have been identified. The proforma regarding assessment of sleep patterns is prepared. A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) has been prepared and signed by Dr Ramakrishnan of the NITRA Sleep Clinic, Chennai. The Clients are being sent to clinic for sleep recording Polysomnography. Sleep pattern are studied from 9.30pm in the night till the child wakes up. 23 children have been sent for sleep analysis. The reports showed problems like non-establishment of Rapid Eye Movement sleep (REM), snoring disturbances, inadequate feeding, seizure disturbances, late onset of sleep and absence of REM sleep in Children with Visual Impairment. It was difficult to record the sleep in children with hyperactivity as they pulled out the sensitive electrodes fixed on the head. The clinic has developed adaptations to record the sleep pattern in hyperactive children. Dr. Ramakrishnan, the expert in sleep disorders has advised a device that will prevent apnoeic attacks in children. Improvements were noticed in the following manner: The attention span has increased, as the children could have prolonged hours of uninterrupted sleep. For all the 23 children assessed – Medication, exercises and modification at home of the sleeping room were provided. It was reported by the parents that there is remarkable improvement in their sleep pattern. The completion of the study showed that many children with Multiple Disabilities have altered sleep patterns. The exact cause for disturbance in sleep will be published soon. The remedy for such disorders will also be an outcome of this study.

#### 8.1.1. Filling up of identified back log post reserved for SC/ST, OBC and PwDs:

In pursuance to GOI instructions to fill up the identified back log vacancies in respect of SC/ST/OBC and Persons with Disabilities, by conducting Special Recruitment drive, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment vide their letter No:D.O.No:27-02/2008 -Cdn dated 7<sup>th</sup> May 2010 had instructed NIEPMD to submit their annual direct recruitment plan, to take necessary action to fill up the backlog vacancies and to submit detailed progress report in this regard. However it is submitted that NIEPMD established in the year 2005 and out of 71 posts sanctioned by GOI/EFC, only 32 posts have been created in Phase – I and that the recruitment action for filling up the sanctioned posts were taken up only after March 2007, there is no back log vacancy identified to be filled up for SC/ST/PwDs/OBC.

The Central Public Information Officer headed by the Director of the Institute who is the Appellate Authority is responsible for providing information to a person who seeks information under the RTI Act. While discharging duties assigned under RTI Act, the Institute received 24 RTI applications during the reporting year 2014-15, out of which 23 applications disposed off. 01 applicant was asked to deposit the money. The Annual Return was submitted to the Central Information Commission (CIC) to this effect.

#### 8.4 Implementation of Official Language

The Committee constituted for the purpose of Hindi implementation in this institute is following all instructions issued by the Department of Official Language (Ministry of Home Affairs) for better use of Hindi in official matters. The office seals and office letter pads are made in bilingual. The RTI applications received in Hindi were replied in Hindi. The institute's monthly report letter had been sent in Hindi and also the question papers pertaining to various examinations were prepared in bilingual and also students were given permission to write the examination in Hindi.

## 8.5 Implementation of various Government orders:

As per the instruction of Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievances and Pensions, Govt. of India, DOPT OM No.11013/3/2009-Estt.(A) dated 21<sup>st</sup> July 2009, NIEPMD had constituted a committee to prevent the sexual harassment of working women in our office, as per the rule 3 of CCS(Conduct) rules,1964, which is functioning effectively. Periodical review meetings of the committee were also carried over during the year 2014-15.

Anti-Terrorism Day was observed on 21<sup>\*</sup> May 2014 to commemorate the death anniversary of former Prime Minister Shri Rajiv Gandhi. In this connection Shri.S.Sankara Narayanan, Deputy Registrar (Administration), NIEPMD administered the Anti-Terrorism day pledge to the Staff and Students.

The Institute observed Sadbhavna Diwas by taking an oath on 20<sup>th</sup> August 2014, marking the birth anniversary of Late Prime Minister of India, Shri Rajiv Gandhi, to promote National Integration and Communal Harmony, adhering to the letter from the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, Government of India, vide O. # Chapter 9

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#### North Eastern states Program

The Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India is focusing towards the empowerment of each and every persons with Disability. In order to achieve the said goal, it directs all National Institutes to set up Extension Centres and initiate more programs for Persons with Disabilities in North Eastern states. As per the direction by the Ministry NIEPMD started the Extension centres at Sikkim and Manipur in collaboration with Spastic Society of Sikkim and Spastic Society of Manipur respectively and also organized various programs for Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities during the year 2014-15. The details of program in North Eastern states are as follows.

#### 9.1 Manipur

#### 9.1.1. Extension Centre

NIEPMD organized Press Meet on 19<sup>th</sup> May 2014 for Inauguration of Extension centre in collaboration with Spastic Society of Manipur at Manipur. 18 representatives from various print and electronic media houses such as DDK Imphal, NE TV, ISTV, Image TV, Impact TV and Local dailies in Manipuri & English, took part in the meet.

#### 9.1.2. Film Festival

NIEPMD organized the Film Festival "Screening Films on Disabilities Celebrating Diversity" in Collaboration with Multi Media Cell, Spastic Society of Manipur at GM Hall, Manipur on 20<sup>th</sup> May 2014. 12 Films depicting disabilities from National and International Films were screened at the Festival. The target group were persons from Mass media, Film fraternity, Persons with Disabilities and Students of Mass communication from Manipur University, Government Officials, Civil Society Organizations, NGOs, Arts and culture fraternity, Professionals and Educators. More than 500 persons participated in the festival. Mr.Roopchandra, Joint Secretary, Social Welfare, Govt. of Manipur, Mr.Ramesh Chandra, Secretary Law, Govt. of Manipur, HOD- Mass Communication, Manipur University, District Level officers from different departments were also present on the occasion.



#### 9.1.3 Distribution Camp

NIEPMD organized "Distribution Camp of Aids and Assistive Devices for Persons with Disabilities" at 1<sup>st</sup> MR Ground, Imphal (Manipur) on 24<sup>th</sup> March 2015. Shri.O.Ibobi Singh, Hon'ble Chief Minister of Manipur was the Chief Guest and Shri. Thaawar Chand Gehlot, Hon'ble Minister for Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India presided over the function. The Guest of Honour of the occasion are Shri.M.Okendro, Hon'ble Minister for Education, Govt. of Manipur and Km.Ak. Mirabai Devi, Hon'ble Minister for Social Welfare, Govt. of Manipur. 971 beneficiaries received a total of 2055 Aids & Appliances during the camp. ### 9.2 SIKKIM

### 9.2.1 Inauguration of Extension Centre

NIEPMD started the Extension centre at Gangtok, Sikkim in collaboration with Spastic Society of Sikkim, Gangtok. The Inaugural function of Extension centre was held on 20<sup>th</sup> January 2015 at Spastic Society of Sikkkim, Gangtok. Smt.Indra Pradhan, Chairperson, State Commission, Social Welfare Department, Govt. of Sikkim was the Chief Guest on the occasion.



### 9.2.2 Parent Training Program

A one day Parent Training Program on "Identification and Management of Children with Multiple Disabilities" was conducted at Spastic Society of Sikkim, Gangtok, Sikkim on 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2015 as part of awareness program for Persons with Disabilities and their family members. The program was inaugurated by Shri. Tika Gurung, Advisor, Dept.of Social Justice, Empowerment & Welfare, Govt. of Sikkim. The session started with the introduction about NIEPMD by Shri.B.S.Santhosh Kanna, Nodal Officer, Sikkim. It was followed by Dr.B.P.Dhakal, HOD, Opthalmology, SNDT Hospital, Govt. of Sikkim on various causes of Multiple Disabilities. He briefed out the reasons for Multiple Disabilities and the screening of children with Multiple Disabilities.





The session was followed by Shri.P.N.Pradhan, Co-ordinator, SSA, Dept. of HRD, Govt. of Sikkim. He enlightened the participants on Educational rehabilitation and inclusive education. He also briefed the scope of providing various modes of education for children with special needs and the reach of SSA. The session was then followed by Shri.Arun Gautham, Physiotherapist on Management of Children with Multiple disabilities with special reference to therapeutic rehabilitation. Various techniques of positioning and facilitation were explained to the participants. This was followed by Smt. Chandra Kala Sharma – Special Educator and Vocational Instructor on Vocational Rehabilitation and Empowerment of Persons with disabilities. The program was concluded with the vote of thanks by Shri.R.P.Dhakal, Principal, Spastic Society of Sikkim. About 33 parents participated in this program.

### 9.2.3. Sports Meet for Persons with Disabilities

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A two day Sports Meet was conducted by NIEPMD in collaboration with Spastic Society of Sikkim, at TMSS Ground, Gangtok, Sikkim during 23<sup>rd</sup> – 24<sup>th</sup> March 2015. The program was inaugurated by Shri. Tika Gurung, Chief Advisor, Dept. of Social Justice, Empowerment & Welfare, Govt. of Sikkim. The other dignitaries present were Smt.Indra Pradhan, Commissioner, Dept. of Social Justice, Empowerment & Welfare, Govt. of Sikkim, Smt.Manitha Mangal, Commissioner, Other Backward Community (OBC) Board, Govt. of Sikkim, Shri.K.B.Pradhan, Joint Secretary, Dept.of Social Justice, Empowerment & Welfare, Govt. of Sikkim, Shri. C.P.Dhakal, Commissioner, Gangtok Municipal Corporation, Shri.B.P, Dhakal, HOD, Opthalmology, SNDT Hospital, Gangtok & Hon'ble Secretary, Spastic Society of Sikkim, along with officials of NIEPMD, Staff of NIEPMD extension centre, Spastic Society of Sikkim, Resource Teachers from SSA, Sikkim, Children with Special needs, parents and other invitees.

To keep up this objective, participants of children with special needs were called all over Sikkim, where around 150 participants registered and gathered at TMSS Ground. The inauguration started with a ceremonial torch lighting followed by the speech of Chief Guest Shri.Tika Gurung and other dignitaries.



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The sports were conducted in lines with Special Olympics games and the same rules and regulations were followed. It was partnered with Dept. of Sports and Youth Affairs, Govt. of Sikkim who also deputed their Physical Education Professionals at various cadres as Resource Person. Sports like Athletes, Track and Field events were conducted.









To name a few are 100 mtrs run, 50 mtrs run, Bocce, Soft Ball throw, Shot Put etc were conducted. The same program continued at various levels and groups on the second day and concluded on 24<sup>th</sup> March 2015 around 2.30 pm. About 183 participants (41 Male & 122 Female) from SSA, Integrated Child Developmental Services (ICDS), Social Welfare Department and Non-governmental organizations working in the field of disabilities participated in the workshop.

The program was inaugurated by Smt. Brigett Warshong, Asst. Commissioner, Social Welfare Department, Meghalaya and a senior rehabilitation professional Mr. SajjedAli, from Dwarjinkyrmen. The Children from Bethany society have demonstrated their potential through fabulous dance performance with live music during the inaugural session which was applauded by the gathering.



The workshop sessions started with introduction to NIEPMD activities, followed by sessions emphasizing on Cerebral Palsy, Autism, Deafblindness, Multiple Disabilities, Mental Retardation, National Trust Act & UNCRPD. The participants interacted with the concerned professionals at the end of each session.





The participants have extended their gratitude for conducting the workshop and they have also expressed that they need these kinds of training programs in Regional Languages such as Khasi, Garo in different places of Meghalaya. The above said Program was coordinated by Shri. S. Sankara Narayanan, Dy. Registrar (Admn) and supported by Shri. D. Stalin Arul Regan, Spl. Teacher (Db).

### 9.4. Arunachal Pradesh

### 9,4.1 Conference

A one day "Regional Conference on Multiple Disabilities" was organized by NIEPMD in association with Department of Social Justice & Tribal Affairs, Govt. of Arunachal Pradesh on 19<sup>th</sup> March 2015 at Jubilee Banquet Hall, Itanagar. A total of 72 participants attended the conference. The participants were from Sarva Sikhsa Abhiyaan, Ramakrishna Mission Hospital, Arunachal Pradesh Handicapped Welfare Society, nurses and doctors from State Hospital.

The one day conference witnessed the inauguration by Hon'ble Minister Shri. Lowandong, Dept. of Social Justice Empowerment & Tribal Affairs and in the presence of Ms.Karya Bagang, Parliamentary Secretary. NIEPMD was represented by Dr. J. Vijayalakshmy, Shri. P. Kamraj and Mr. Rajesh Ramachandran (Co-ordinator). Prof P. Jeyachandran was a special invitee for the programme. Dr. J. Vijayalakshmy briefed the audience about the objectives of NIEPMD. Prof P. ### 9.5 TRIPURA

### 9.5.4. Workshop

Regional Level Workshop on Assessment, Evaluation and Certification of Persons with Disabilities was organized by NIEPMD on 28<sup>th</sup> March 2015 at Agartala. About 296 Participants attended the Program.

#### 9.6. Assam

Strengthening existing CBR programs functioning in the North Eastern States of India is a joint initiative of NIEPMD and PVVI for developing services in the N. East region for children with Multiple Disabilities/Visual Impairment with Multiple Disabilities. An important step towards developing services is to build the capacity of the CBR Coordinators and CBR workers working across several states in the N. East which in turn will help them to provide services of a better quality in terms of Program planning, Provision of Educational Materials as per children's needs and service delivery.

#### 9.6.1 CBR Coordinators Training Program

Training Program on "Multiple Disabilities and Visual Impairment with Additional Disabilities" for Coordinators of Community Based Rehabilitation from North East Region was jointly organized by National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities (NIEPMD), Chennai and Perkins Voice and Vision India (PVVI), Mumbai from 8<sup>th</sup> to 13<sup>th</sup> September 2014 at NIEPMD, Chennai.



22 participants (includes 12 male and 10 female) took part in the program representing from Assam, Arunachal Pradesh, Mizoram, Nagaland and Meghalaya. The training was scheduled with theory sessions in the morning and practical and hands-on training sessions in the afternoon. They have been given training about Multiple Disabilities and its various combination, causes, education, other intervention strategies pertaining to the condition were dealt by concerned experts from NIEPMD and PVVI. Early intervention for children with Multiple Disabilities and its importance was also explained in detail with practical demonstration. The participants underwent sessions of training on adaptations that can be prepared in home and community for enhancing Activities of Daily Living, Mobility and Education. There were sessions and discussions on various Acts, Policies and Legislations viz. Right to Education ACT, National Trust Act, UNCRPD & Incheon Strategies. A presentation on various schemes of Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India was presented to avail for creating enabling environment for persons with multiple disabilities in their region. The available Aids and Appliances and ICT for intervention of Persons with Multiple Disabilities were also covered during the training sessions.



### 9.6.2 CBR workers Training Program



### 9.7. Mizoram

### 9.7.1.Film Festival

NIEPMD organized the Film Festival on Disability and Related Issus in collaboration with Department of Social Work and Mizoram University, at Aizwal, Mizoram from  $23^{rd} - 25^{th}$  March 2015. 602 participants took part in this three day festival.





### Chapter 10

### **Composite Regional Centre for Persons with Disabilities**

Composite Regional Centre (CRC) for the Persons with Disabilities at Kozhikode, Kerala was established by Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Dept. of Disability Affairs, Govt. of India) to provide comprehensive rehabilitation to the Person with Disabilities. It has been functioning at Social Welfare complex, Vellimadukunnu, since 2011 under the administrative control of NIEPMD. It provides technical and manpower support to CRC. The Objectives of CRC-Kozhikode are as follows.



Involving Parents in Group Therapy to empower in maintain eye-hand coordination skill & turn taking skill.

- To undertake human resource development by training rehabilitation professionals, village level workers, multi-rehabilitation workers and other functionaries in Government and Non-Govt. sector, required for providing services to persons with disabilities.
- 2. To undertake public education programs for creation of awareness in the parents and the community.
- 3. To undertake designing, fabrication and fitment of aids and appliances.
- 4. To undertake services of education and skill development leading to enhancement of

opportunities for employment, rehabilitation, mobility communication recreation and integration in society.

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- 5. To undertake research and development with specific reference to needs of diverse groups of people with disability, keeping in view the nature and severity of disability in the region.
- 6. To develop strategies for delivery of rehabilitation services suitable to the socio-cultural background of the region.
- 7. To stimulate growth of services by encouraging and supporting voluntary organization, parent groups and self-help groups.
- To establish linkages with existing medical, educational and employment services following the principles of community-based rehabilitation and offer extension services in the rural areas.

### Chapter 11

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#### Audit Reports & Annual Accounts

An amount of Rs.22.75 crores were total receipts for the year 2014-15, among those an amount of Rs.2.64 crore was closing balance for the year 2013-14, Rs.9.29 crores had been received as Grants-in-aid from MSJ&E, GOI, and Rs.10.82 crores was collected as Receipts of Tuition fees. Registration fees, Guest House charges and application fees, RIP Maturity and Interest, SB Interest for the year 2014-15. The Recurring and Non-recurring expenses during the year 2014-15 was Rs.19.68 crores and the closing balance as on 31<sup>st</sup> March 2015 amounting to Rs.3.07 Lakhs will be carried over for the year 2015-16.

In terms of Section 20(1) of C&AG's (DPC) Act, 1971, the CAG, New Delhi had entrusted audit of Annual Accounts of NIEPMD for a period of 5 years from financial year 2006-11 and extended another period of 5 years from 2010-11 to 2015-16 vide O.M.No.1(16)-B(R)/2011, dt.27-07-2011 from Department of Economic affairs, Ministry of Finance to the Director General of Audit (CENTRAL), Chennai. Accordingly, the DAG (C), Chennai is auditing the annual accounts of NIEPMD.

For the financial year 2014-15, the audited statement of accounts comprising of accounts statement, Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure statement and Receipts and Payments details which were submitted to the Director General of Audit (CENTRAL), Chennai. The audit team was deputed by the Director General of Audit (CENTRAL), Chennai visited NIEPMD for audit from 19-10-2015 to 30-10-2015. The Audit Report, Audit Certificate and certified accounts of the Institute for the Financial Year 2014-15 were received from the Office of the Director General of Audit (Central) vide letter No: DGA (C)/CAB/I/28-83/2015-16/202 dated 04.03.2016.

1. We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities. Chennai as at 31 March 2015, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payment Account for the year ended on that date under Section 20(1) of the Comptroller & Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971. The audit has been entrusted for the period up to 2015-2016. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Institute's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

2. This Separate Audit Report Contains the comments of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification. Conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cumperformance aspects, etc., if any are reported through Inspection Report/CAG's Audit Reports separately.

3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences assessing the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

4 Based on our audit, we report that:

- i. We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit.
- ii. The Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipt & Payment Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format approved by Government of India, Ministry of Finance.
- iii. In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities, Chennai as requited in the rules and regulations of the Institute in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.

iv. We further report that:

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#### **Balance Sheet**

#### Assets

#### Fixed Assets (Sch.8) - Rs.34.93 Crore.

The institute had omitted to provide depreciation amounting to Rs.24,14,364/- on the Net Asset Value of some of the fixed assets (Plant & Machinery, Furniture & Fixtures. Office equipment and Computer Peripherals) brought forward from previous year. This has resulted in understatement of depreciation and overstatement of fixed assets to the extent of Rs.24.14 Lakh.

#### **B** Receipts & Payments Account

Based on audit observations, the institute has separated the GPF transactions from Institute's main accounts and furnished separate financial statements including Receipts & Payment account for GPF. However, the bank transactions of GPF were not removed from NIEPMD Receipts and Payments account. As such the bank transactions of GPF were accounted in two Receipts and Payments accounts. This has resulted in incorrect closing bank balance to the extent of Rs.32.11 Lakh in NIEPMD R&P account.

#### C General

The accrued interest on investments as on 31.03.2015 was Rs. 19,84,029/- However, the institute has disclosed an amount of Rs.46,96,425/- as accrued interest in its revised accounts. The difference in accrued interest amounting to Rs. 27,12,396/- needs to be reconciled.

# 2. Accounting of Retirement benefits was not as per the accounting policy mentioned in significant accounting policies.

It was mentioned in the 'Significant accounting policies' enclosed to financial statements that retirement benefits were accounted on cash basis. However a provision of Rs.27.06 lakh was created in accounts for Gratuity and Leave encashment during the year based on their own calculation instead of actuarial valuation. As such the accounting for retirement benefits was not as per the accounting policy mentioned in financial statements.

#### 3. No cash books were maintained for four bank accounts maintained by the Institute.

The institute has not maintained any cash book for the separate bank accounts operated operated in the name of Composite Regional Centre – Kozhikode, IGNOU-SSC, NIEPMD-Pension/gratunity and

NIEPMD-GPF account. Hence, the correctness of transactions made in these accounts and the closing bank balance of these accounts disclosed under current assets in balance sheet could not be verified in audit.

# 4. The Correctness of balance disclosed in North East Region fund under earmarked funds in balance sheet could not be ensured.

The institute has been maintaining a separate fund for operations of North East Region (NER) under earmarked funds. Out of a sum of Rs. 1.00 crore fixed deposit receipt matured during the year, excluding the interest earned on maturity, an amount of Rs. 1.00 crore was added to the NER find under liabilities side. How the FDR maturity was added to the fund instead of bank account under assets side was not explained by the institute. Similarly interest earned on earmarked funds was not added to the respective fund. In view of the above, the correctness or closing balance of NER fund amounting to Rs.31.47 Lakh disclosed in balance sheet could not be ensured.

#### 5. Non provision of interest payable on NPS.

This institute had retained the employer & employee contributions to New pension systems (NPS) in its own accounts till 2012. During 2012-13, the accumulated contribution to NPS was transferred to NSDL, but the interest amounting to Rs.20,28,150/- for the period the funds retained by the institute was not remitted to NSDL. But, no provision for the interest payable on NPS was created in the accounts.

#### 6. Correctness of closing balance of capital fund could not be ensured.

An amount of Rs.35,27,266/- was deducted from capital fund stating it as difference between actual and accured interest on TDR. The reasons for the deduction made from capital fund were not explained. Hence, the correctness of closing balance of capital fund could not be verified in audit.

7. The accounting policy adopted for materials purchased for distribution under 'Assistance to Disabled persons' (ADIP) Scheme was not mentioned in financial statements. However, it was noticed that these purchases ware accounted on cash basis. The inventory of these items lying at the end of the year was not taken into account. According to uniform format of accounting prescribed by Ministry, financial statements have to be prepared in accrual basis, Hence, the inventory of material purchased under ADIP scheme may be accounted in financial statements.



# 8. Adequate classification of expenditure should be made for expenditure disclosed in financial statements

On review expenditure incurred for North East Region, It was seen that a single amount of Rs.83,45,171/- was disclosed as expenditure during the year. Though it was stated in reply to draft SAR that breakup details were furnished. no such details were enclosed to reply. The wxpenditure incurred may be suitably classified under different heads and disclosure of combined figure may be avoided.

#### **D** Effect of revision in accounts

The accounts of the Institute were revised on the basis of audit observations. As a result of revision. Assets and Liabilities were increased by Rs.0.11 crore and the Excess Expenditure over Income was decreased by Rs.0.32 crore.

#### E Grants in aid

Out of the total grant of Rs. 13.88 crore received during the year 2014-2015 (NIEPMD Main A/c - Rs.9.30 crore, ADIP Scheme Rs.3.60 Crore CRC, Kozhikode Rs.0.98 crore), Rs.3.23 crore being the grant brought forward from the previous year, the Institute could utilize Rs.13.25 crore leaving a balance of Rs.3.86 crore (NIEPMD Main A/c - Rs.3.07 crore, ADIP Scheme - Rs. 0.07 Crore and CRC, Kozhikode - Rs.0.72 crore) as at  $31^{st}$  March 2015.

#### F Management Letter

Deficiencies which have not been included in the Audit Report have been brought to the notice of the Director, National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities (NIEPMD) through a management letter issued separately for remedial / corrective action.

- Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipt & Payment Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.
- vi In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the said financial statements read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes an Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in Annexure to this Audit Report give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India.

Please refer to the Separate Audit Report on the audit of Annual Accounts of National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities, Muttukadu Chennai for the year 2014-15 issued on 01.2016. I wish to bring the following defects noticed in accounting practices/ procedures to your notice for remedial action.

1. It was mentioned in the books of accounts that the closing balance of advance given to CPWD as on 31.03.2015 was Rs.8,03,34,959/-. However, no records were furnished to Audit from CPWD (such as Formeo) to confirm the actual closing balance of advance lying with them Hence, the institute could obtain Form-65 from CPWD for the month of March every year to ensure the amount of work in progress and unutilized advance lying with them was as per the figures disclosed in. the financial statements of the institute. (Point 4 of 2.3.5)

2. The details furnished in the Bank. reconciliation statement prepared for NIEPMD- Main bank account were not clear. An amount of Rs.1,19,23,712 was disclosed as Cheques issued but not present for payment' and Rs.4,13,677/- was disclosed as Cheques deposited but not collected' as on 31.03.2015. However, the details regarding the date on which the cheques were issued and the date on which the cheques deposited but. not collected were not available in the BRS. All the details may be furnished with regard to these kind of pending cheques at the year end. (Sub para 7(iii) of para 2.3.5.)

3. Disclosure of some of the items in rupees and some of the items in paisa in financial statements was causing confusion in reading the financial statements. Moreover, as per the format given by Ministry also, the figures in the financial statements have to be rounded off to nearest rupee. It was also noticed that for some schedules previous year figures were given in first column and current year figures in next column and for some.other schedules the year

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wise details were given vice versa. (Para 8 of 2.3.5). Brought to notice for corrective action in next year.

4. The schedule of Significant accounting policies' enclosed to . financial statements" should mention the accounting policies adopted by your institute for preparation of financial statements. Whereas the schedule of 'significant accounting policies ' enclosed by your institute prescribes what policies to be followed and had not mentioned what policies were followed by your institute. Though it was stated in reply to. draft SAR that the schedule was corrected, no corrections were actually made in revised accounts. (Para 9 of 2.3.5)

#### 5. Non-maintenance of proper records

It was noticed that the Stock register for disabled persons materials was not updated. The receipt of all materials purchased for distribution or sale to disabled persons and the issues made out of them should be recorded in stock register. The Physical verification of closing inventory with the stock register has to be done periodically and certified by a competent authority.

It was observed that the fixed assets register was not updated and physical verification of fixed assets was not done at the end .of the year. Investment register may also be maintained to ensure -the details of deposits made, deposits matured, amount of interest received and amount of interest accrued, etc.,

6. The accounting for government grants by your institute was not as per the uniform

format prescribed by the Ministry of Finance. According to the format, revenue grants and capital grants have to be accounted separately. Revenue grant utilized to meet the current year expenditure alone has to be transferred as matching income & Income & Expenditure account. Capital grant utilized for purchase of capital assets during the year has to be transferred to capital fund. The. remaining unutilized portion of both capital and revenue grants has to be disclosed as 'unutilised grant' under current liabilities. (Para 2.2.1)
